As the political nerve center of the country, the Nanking-Shanghai area will be held at all costs, and the government is determined to throw in all available forces for a decisive battle. "I firmly believe the government will win out in the end, and it also will mark the turning point in the war."

M'Arthur Restores Old Flag to Japanese Nation

TOKYO, Dec. 31.—(AP)—General MacArthur gave the Japanese back their flag today, telling them they could fly it any place, any time. Thus, for the first time since the surrender, the Rising Sun emblem can flutter from the staffs of Japan without special permission. The reaction of the average Japanese to permission to fly the flag was varied. "I don't care a bit," another said: "Now we have something to take the place of what the emperor used to be before the end of the war."

McKellar Defeats Tydings For Top Senate Post

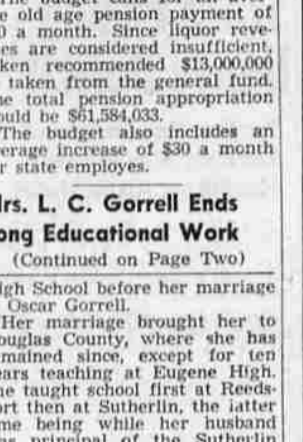
WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—(AP)—Senator McKellar (D-Tenn.) defeated Senator Tydings (D-M.D.) 27 to 25 in a nip and tuck fight for the office of president pro tempore of the Senate. The vote was at a meeting of the 54 Democratic Senators. The meeting worked out the slate of officers the Democrats will propose—and put in since they have a majority—when the new Senate meets Monday.
