Use of Deadly Serum In Japan Is Halted

TOKYO, Dec. 31. (AP) — The Japanese immunization program was halted today because of the deaths of 64 persons and the illness of 900 more.

Brig. Gen. Crawford F. Sams of Tracy, Calif., General MacArthur's health director, ordered the halt while vaccines were recalled and examined.

Faulty diphtheria toxin was blamed for the deaths, most of which occurred in Southern Honshu, Kyoto and Shikane Prefectures.

General Sims said legal action against the manufacturer of the faulty vaccines would be taken. The immunization program has been administered by Japanese doctors with the occupation's health section only in an advisory capacity.

Yugoslav parliament, he charges that Yugoslavia has been FORCED to buy manufactured articles from the Eastern Communist bloc at HIGH PRICES and sell her own raw resources to the Communist hierarchs for LOW PRICES.

He wasn't just muttering in his beard. He followed his grievance statement with a THREAT. If this continues, he said, Yugoslavia will cut off supplies of raw materials to the Soviet bloc and will SELL THEM INSTEAD TO THE CAPITALIST COUNTRIES.

That would be independent action.

Communism doesn't tolerate independent action.

THIS is the point of Tito's statement that interests us:

He is asserting that there are KINDS OF COMMUNISM. Moscow's Communism, he says, is doing dirt to Yugoslavia Communism. If it doesn't stop, he intimates, there is going to be trouble.

To the Communist big shots in the Kremlin, that is treason of the first water. It questions their right to run the Communist racket as they see fit, with no questions asked.

WE judge the future by the past. We say: "What has happened once can happen again."

THIS happened once:

Thirteen weak colonies in America REBELLED AGAINST MOTHER ENGLAND BECAUSE OF THIS SAME INJUSTICE THAT RILES TITO.

Our ancestors were angered to the point of war because England insisted on selling us all our manufactured articles at high prices and buying all our raw materials at low prices.

That is PRECISELY what Tito is complaining about.

THE THIRTEEN WEAK LITTLE COLONIES EVENTUALLY GREW INTO A NATION THAT HAS NOW SURPASSED BRITON IN POWER.
