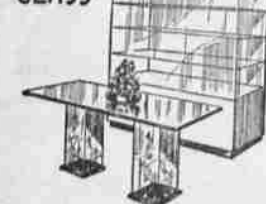

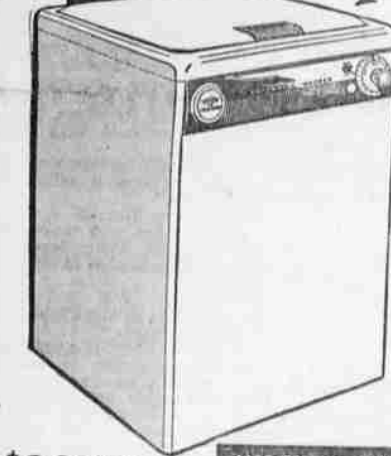

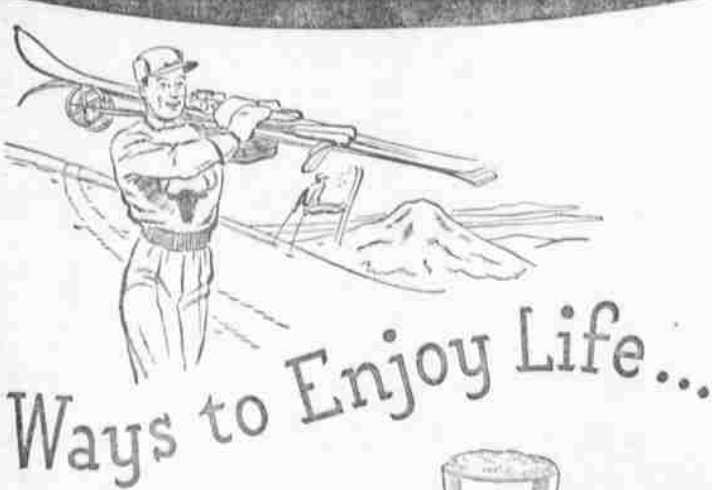

Funeral Services Set For Drowned Youth

REEDSPORT—Funeral services will be held Wednesday at 11 a. m. at the Episcopal Church in Gardiner for Robin A. Gay of Reedport, who was drowned in Schofield River in Reedport Thursday afternoon while hunting ducks.

Robin was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Ivan Gay of Reedport. Mr. Gay is yard foreman for the E. K. Wood Lumber Co. mill here.

Robin was born in North Bend Oct. 11, 1931, and spent his entire life in Reedport, attending the grade and high schools here. He was a Junior member of the Reedport High School band, the Episcopal Church and Reedport Sea Scouts.

Missing Thursday afternoon following his hunting trip, a search was made that evening and his body found partially filled with water. State Police Sgt. Richard Miles, Reedport, led searching parties. Aid was given by the Umpqua River Coast Guard crew, and volunteers, many of the latter being from the E. K. Wood Lumber Co. crew.

The body was recovered Saturday, Bishop Benjamin Dagwell of Portland, a long-time friend of the Gay family, will officiate at the funeral, and interment will be in the Reedport Masonic Cemetery.

Dendrick Potter French, 88, died Jan. 3 at his home near Keely's Korner after a short illness. He was born July 2, 1860, in Knoxville, Tenn., and came to this community 40 years ago to make his home.

from residents along Military, Key and Harvard Avenues relative to driveways, which have been rendered useless by widening of these streets. Mayor Albert G. Flegel endorsed the street committee's report, adopted at the last meeting, that the city would not construct driveways from the streets. The principal difficulty arises in the fact that the wider street sets the curbs within 18 inches of the sidewalks, and makes too sharp a rise from the streets to the sidewalks. The mayor considered the issue closed, when no councilman reopened the discussion.

Report of a special committee was read recommending exclusion of soft drinks and food vending machines from the ordinance taxing all coin machines within the city. The report was turned over to the city attorney for drafting of an amendment.

Street Job Price Uppep
The city accepted a report from the contractor, E. L. Gates and Company, for the improvement of South Jackson Street. The contract price was for \$12,919.50, but the actual cost amounted to \$15,491.50 because of additional base gravel needed and ordered by the city engineer. The Council voted that the city stand the additional expenditure, and that the city manager and street committee meet for apportioning the costs to the property owners of the original contract price plus legal and advertising expenses.

Request was made in writing by Dr. E. E. Lindell that he be permitted to deviate from setback line building requirements in the construction of a proposed 41 by 64-foot, one-story, cement block building at Douglas and Kane Streets. The building, proposed as a medical clinic, would cost an estimated \$25,000. The property is located in residential class 2, which would permit such construction, but there would not be sufficient room for the structure as proposed if the 15-foot setback from abutting streets and 10-foot setback from the property lines were followed. The request was referred to the city manager and city attorney.

The Council was notified by the State Highway Commission of its approval of traffic signal lights at Lane and Washington Streets on Stephens. The total cost would be \$500, half of which the city would have to pay, plus electricity for operation. As the city has no funds available, the matter will have to await the forthcoming budget.

The Council approved the request of Jack Todd and Mr. Phillips for waiver of bond for their establishment of The Coffee Cup, sandwich shop on South Stephens, in a portion of the new building housing a cleaning business. Bond was also waived for the Oriental Inn, to be established by Dorothy and Chester Houser at 505 No. Jackson.

The planning commission's recommendation against rezoning of property in the south part of town between South Stephens and the railroad track from residential to business was approved. This request, made by O. N. Wallace, was considered "spot" zoning.

Council committees were not appointed at this meeting, as scheduled. Mayor Flegel announced the appointments would

block. They proposed that any time a legislative committee approved a bill and the Rules Committee doesn't clear it for a House vote within 21 days, the chairman of the Legislative Committee can force action.

He can do it simply by making, and getting carried, on the second or fourth Monday or any month, a motion to bring the blocked bill before the house. The new rule requires the speaker to recognize the chairman for that purpose.

Since most House chairmen are administration Democrats, the party leadership expects no trouble with Rules Committee bottlenecks. Normally, the leadership tells committee chairmen when and how to move.

Union Is Established
Regardless of a decision by their party steering committee to fight the rule change, 49 Republicans went along with the Truman Democrats in support of the bottleneck-breaking plan. It was carried by a 275-to-142 vote. These 49 Republicans more than offset the 31 Southern and border-state Democrats who refused to back the change.

The result was that, in the first test of strength in the new House, there was not a coalition of Republicans and Southern Democrats in control, but a union of Truman Democrats and Republicans in the saddle.

Democratic floor leader McCormack of Massachusetts called it "A decided step in the direction of the House carrying out President Truman's program."

Republican leaders wouldn't comment for the record on the biggest break from discipline in recent years.

But one of them said privately "It looks like some of the boys are afraid of last November's election results."

Senate Republicans yesterday elected Senator Wherry of Nebraska as their floor leader. Wherry defeated Senator Knowland of California, the nominee of a group of GOP insurgents against the old leadership. The vote was 28 to 14.

This setback was the second of the day for the insurgents. Earlier, the GOP regulars smashed a move to unseat Senator Taft of Ohio as chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee.

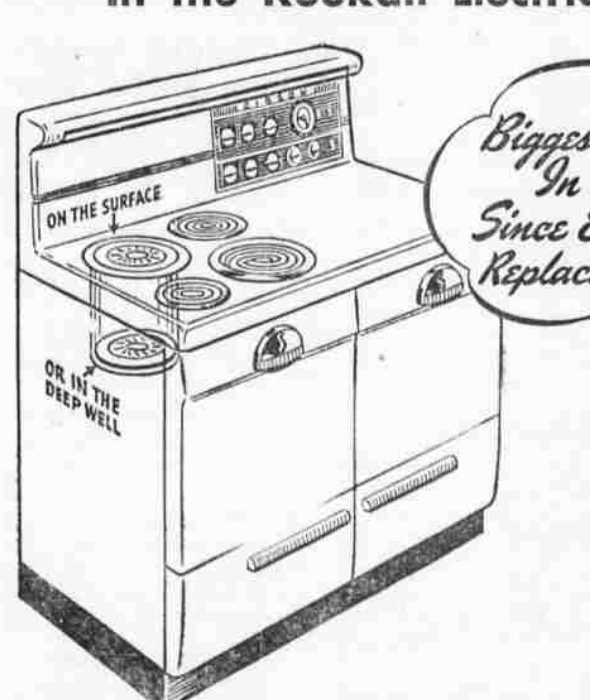
