

Boxers Billed For Card Here January 14th

Ortega, Garrison Will Be Headliners; Wolf, Cowan Listed for Semi-Final

Promoter Ernie Nazelrod will feature a fine aggregation of glove artists in the first of a series of professional and amateur bouts to be held at the Roseburg Armory.

Nazelrod will hold one professional and one amateur show each month. The first card, scheduled for Friday, Jan. 14, will feature light heavyweight Joe Ortega of Portland and Red Garrison of Spokane in a 10-round main event. The winner will fight Canada's light heavyweight champion Kenny Lindsay on Jan. 28.

The six-round semi-final will bring Dick Wolf of Portland and Pinky Cowan of Spokane together. Welterweight Cowan is considered one of the best fighters in the west. He's racked up a string of KOs out of 20 starts, according to promoter Nazelrod. Cowan fought and defeated Bucky O'Connor in a previous fight here.

Bob Nazelrod, brother of promoter Ernie, will fight an opponent, as yet unnamed, in a six-round special. Young Nazelrod is considered top-flight fighter material locally, having won all three of his fights here. His opponent will probably be from Spokane, brother Ernie reports.

Tony House, 180-pound, six-foot one-inch negro fighter from Wilbur will be one of the contenders in the four-round preliminary. House is considered a real fighter. He has met such opponents as Jack Fox, light-heavyweight crown contender, in exhibition bouts. House's opponent may be a Portland fighter.

The five-event card will get under way with a four-round curtain raiser. Nazelrod said he is in the process of signing fighters for this particular engagement.

Admission is 50 cents. Students with student body cards will be admitted for 25 cents.
