

New Mayor Ousts Ashland Officials; Battle Still On

ASHLAND, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Ashland's new mayor suspended the chief of police and the city attorney Tuesday night in the climax of a battle between the mayor and the City Council.

The Council promptly retaliated by requiring a public hearing on the suspensions. The hearing will be held Friday.

Mayor Tom Williams, a railroad conductor who won over four candidates on a campaign promise of a "refreshing change" in city government, had nominated two new officials as police chief and city attorney.

The six members of the City Council thwarted him by unanimously voting against the proposed men.

Mayor Williams Tuesday night leveled a new blow by suspending the present officials—City Attorney William M. Briggs and Chief of Police C. C. Williams.

That was countered by the councilmen, who over the mayor's veto passed an ordinance requiring that any suspension of public officials must be subject to a council hearing.

The new mayor abolished the office of city superintendent, and kept the superintendent—E. C. Biegel—on temporarily as superintendent of the electrical department.

Four of the mayor's recommendations were approved by the council: The reappointment of Earl Hoiler as water superintendent, Clint Baughman as fire chief, Howard Ogden as street superintendent, and the appointment of L. P. Wilmouth, the mayor's campaign manager, as city judge.

While the mayor-council battle raged, the citizenry began taking a hand. A mass meeting of more than 1,000 people was held at which petitions are being circulated asking the recall of three hold-over councilmen. The other three could not legally be recalled until they have served six months.

Farm Units Will Defend Milk Control Statute

PORTLAND, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Farm groups were asked today by the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation to rally in support of the state milk control law which sets minimum prices and maximum standards.

W. S. Caverhill, Pendleton representative of the federation, said state farm leaders have been asked to attend a Jan. 14 meeting here.

Oregon State College specialists, legislators and State Department of Agriculture representatives are also expected to attend.

W. Lowell Steen, Milton, State Federation president, will lead the discussion aimed at formulating moves to counter action by a Portland consumer group to upset the state law.

The Portland Affiliated Milk Committee, composed largely of women's club legislators, is expected to ask the legislature to either repeal the law or revise retail pricing regulations.

Bomber Lost in Series Of War Plane Mishaps

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 6.—(AP)—A search on land and sea was planned by the Navy today for an attack bomber missing from Alameda Naval Air Station since noon yesterday.

Latest of three mishaps for military planes in northern California, the bomber's disappearance on a routine flight followed by only a few hours the collision of two Navy fighters 60 miles off the Golden Gate. Two pilots were feared dead.

At McClellan Field, Sacramento, an investigation was underway in the Tuesday night crash of a C-47 Air Force transport fatal to eight men in the Sierra Nevada foothills.

The missing Alameda bomber was manned by one officer, on a two-hour familiarization flight. His name was withheld.

Judge Wimberly Serves On Lane County Bench

Astoria Battles Slide To Save City Segment
ASTORIA, Ore., Jan. 6.—(AP)—Rain-soaked Astoria has gone to "dry" California to figure out how to stop water from pushing away a hillside that is threatening a city bridge and numerous homes.

A special hole-boring machine developed by the California Highway Department will be brought by the city in an effort to lick the problem, the council decided.

Underground water pools are first located by vertical drillings and then the machine drills a lateral tapping hole to drill the area. Perforated pipe is then inserted in the hole to drain it, City Manager James O. Conwill told the commission.

The city hopes this will stop a 40-year slide that has moved as much as 25 feet this winter, threatening a new street bridge and bringing threats of legal action from home owners.

Lack of Etiquette At Funeral Processions Cited

Frequent "breaches of etiquette" on the part of the public during funeral processions were noted by the Roseburg Ministerial Association, at its January meeting Wednesday.

The Rev. Willis F. Erickson, secretary, said the main difficulty has been that cars will frequently cut into the processions, either by trying to break through in cross traffic or by trying to pass.

In the hope that this situation can be amended, the Ministerial Association offers four recommendations to the community and to whomever it may concern.

These are: (1) that cars in funeral processions should be in the rear of the procession.

(2) that police provide adequate escort whenever possible; (3) that bumper flags be attached to participating vehicles; and (4) that the public pay due attention and proper respect to funeral processions.
