Girl is Suicide After Spot With Boy Friend

DETROIT, Jan. 6 — (AP) — It was unbearable to pretty 15-year-old Donna Joyce that a "swell guy" like Bobby should call everything off.

"To 'all the kids' Donna wished 'better luck than I had.' In the official records here her death was listed as a suicide. And her grieving parents dwell sorrowfully on her request to 'dress me in a black sweater and gray skirt and leave Bobby's ring around my neck.'"

Donna, a policeman's daughter, was found dying Tuesday of a revolver shot in her chest. The gun belonged to her father, Paul Herman Joyce.

In the living room beside her lay her farewell note—"I love Bobby too much to live without him." Bobby, 17, was her high school boy friend. Recently they had quarreled.
