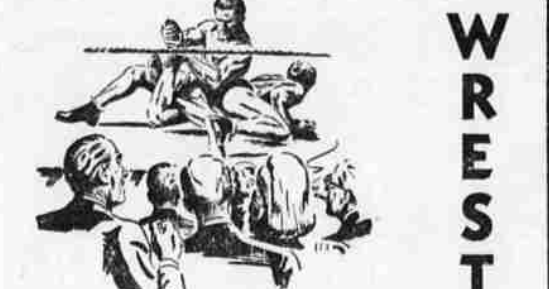

Czechs Open High Priced Market To Beat Racketeers PRAGUE, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Czechoslovakia opened up a high priced free market today to operate alongside its strictly rationed market. Typical prices in the free market: Men's ties at \$12, children's overcoats at \$58, women's underpants at \$20 and a skirt at \$78. Buyers were started at price tags shown in windows. Only stores designated by the Communist-dominated government may sell in the rationed goods for free sale. Communist Finance Minister Dolansky asserted the free market would drive out the black market and give workers priority on clothing. Men's shoes sold on ration tickets were taxed 14 per cent and made available in the free market also at prices four and a half times those of stores have been closed since Christmas eve for government inventory. The trade union newspaper Peace said merchants, employers, professional persons and farmers owning more than 30 acres of land will be issued no clothing on textile coupons but will be forced to buy on the free market. Members of the families up to 15 years of age also will get no ration coupons.

Truman Program Finds Approval In Western Europe LONDON, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Western Europe, most of it under socialist control, today generally interpreted President Truman's state-of-the-union message as evidence the United States will move further to the left. And, generally, it was pleased. The Communists were pleased, too—but for a different reason. They seized upon the chief executive's program as propaganda to prove social and economic backwardness in the United States. In Britain, however, the independent liberal Manchester Guardian cited Mr. Truman's program as an indication that "socialism is not the only path for the left. Its goal might be met by the insurance state, its method the deliberate shortening of the odds against the weak, but without abandoning the basically individualist way of life which is accepted as characteristically American." The London Evening Star, a liberal paper also, said the president "has surpassed Roosevelt's new deal in scope and political daring." It declared Mr. Truman has set himself a "colossal task" and added: "The social revolution in America may be well under way by 1952."

In western Germany, the press took a similar line. The Frankfurt Neue Presse, independent, said the United States, "is congratulating itself from a liberal to a social democracy for which the well-being of the masses is more important than the wealth of the few." In Berlin, however, Russian-licensed newspapers reported the message under the headlines "Truman wants higher taxes" and "Truman exposes shocking abuses." They emphasized what they also juxtaposed out was pouring firming of the low standard of living, lack of education, and capitalistic exploitation of American workers—all three favorite themes in the Communist press.

The item, a Tass dispatch from Washington, said the speech was devoted basically to domestic problems, but also contained "most important foreign policy questions." Russian readers were told also that congress does not intend to drop the house un-American activities committee.
