Court Compels Mother to Yield Kidnaped Child

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Vicki Jeanne Snyder, a pretty three-year-old who has a delayed Christmas party waiting for her in Harrisburg, Pa., yesterday was ordered given to her grandfather for return to that state.

Superior Judge A. A. Scott said he had no alternative but to take Vicki from her mother, Mrs. Jeanne Morgan Braget, 23, who faces a kidnaping charge in Pennsylvania, and give the girl to the paternal grandfather, Harry Snyder, Harrisburg beauty parlor operator.

Snyder, who came here for the child, said Vicki missed a Sunday School Christmas party Dec. 20 at the Evangelical United Brethren Church because the mother did not return after taking her from his home for Christmas shopping. He said the Sunday School teacher has promised that a Christmas tree will remain trimmed at the church until Vicki returns.

Mrs. Braget and her husband, John M. Braget of Tacoma, Wash., surrendered to police in nearby Pomona Dec. 28 after reading in newspapers that they were wanted in Pennsylvania.

At yesterday's hearing, the Bragets' attorney attacked legality of the adoption proceedings by which the grandfather obtained custody of Vicki. Mrs. Braget testified that she signed some papers but did not know what they were and would not have signed them if she knew she was giving up her daughter permanently.

Mrs. Braget's ex-husband, Harry H. Snyder, Santa Monica, Calif., mechanic, attended the hearing with his father. The grandfather testified that he adopted Vicki in 1946 and that she had lived in his home since she was four months of age. His son did not testify.

The Bragets face a hearing later on a fugitive complaint. They are charged with fleeing from Pennsylvania, where they are wanted on the kidnaping count. The Bragets announced through their attorney that they will fight to regain the baby and vigorously oppose extradition to Pennsylvania.

France Sends Gifts To U. S. in Gratitude for Aid

PARIS, Jan. 7.—(AP)—A train of 49 box cars loaded with more than 1,000,000 gifts from France to America left Paris yesterday for Le Havre.

The cars will be loaded on the ship "Magellan" and will sail for New York Jan. 13.

"This boxcar is presented by the French National Railroads to the State of — in gratitude for the help given to France by the American people."

Mr. Wolff Must Pay \$700 On Love Piracy Charge

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 7.—(AP)—A Seattle Wolff must pay \$700 for alienating the affections of the wife of a soldier serving overseas during the war, the state supreme court held yesterday.

The court denied Peter Wolff's appeal from a lower court judgment awarding the amount to Eric Walsh. The World War II veteran charged that Wolff, "through wife and blandishments," had influenced his wife to transfer her affections to him, the high court said.

A superior court had previously denied Mrs. Walsh a divorce. Walsh was given \$200 for defending the divorce action and the balance for loss of affections.

The high court said Wolff and Mrs. Walsh became acquainted while both were working for the State Liquor Control Board. Walsh was stationed in British West Africa at the time.

New Formula Sought To End Potato Dispute

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Congressional action may be sought to fix a new quota formula in the East-West potato fight, two Eastern representatives said yesterday.

Rep. Barden (D.-N.C.) and Rep. Harby (D.-Va.) said in separate interviews they are considering offering some such measure.

Barden said he has just received "a final report" from the Department refusing to change the 1949 acreage quotas set in November. "For three years now," he said, "the acreage for Eastern States

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
