

Roseburg Beats Sutherlin 48 to 26

Second Team Carries Load Second Half

Newby's Ball Players Far Outclass Smaller Team Here Last Night

Indian Coach Jack Newby threw in everything but the managers in a league tilt against Sutherlin Friday night, to win by a 48-26 score in a game played at Roseburg High.

After a definite scoring trend was established, with Roseburg on top, Newby dug into his reserve barrel. As a result each member of the 12-man team got in at least three periods of play. Bob Rogers paced the Roseburg-bolling after the half, faked and flunked one in for two points, followed by Don Hubbard, who shot a long one from near the sideline for two more. Bob Schindler got control of the ball and hung on.

With three minutes gone in the third period, Dexter Garey, Kee Briggs, Dale Black, Frank Olson and Bill Van Horn went into the game, to face three of Coach Orrin Hills' starters and two second stringers.

The locals had the ball around, then Bob Sanders and Neil Wising came into the game. Sanders looked the field over, heaved the ball to Dale Black, who threw it to Olson for another tally. All in all, the second team bettered the score by 15 during the third period.

The fourth quarter saw the pace quicken somewhat, with both sides shooting, missing and losing the ball. Here, the scoring was rather evenly distributed, with Roseburg tallying nine, while Sutherlin collected seven points.

Bob Rogers paced the Roseburgers with 10 points, while Tom Haskett topped both teams' individual scoring with 12 points. Tonight the Indians go to North Bend for another league tilt, the third this week. They play Cottage Grove Tuesday night in a return match, on the Senior High court.

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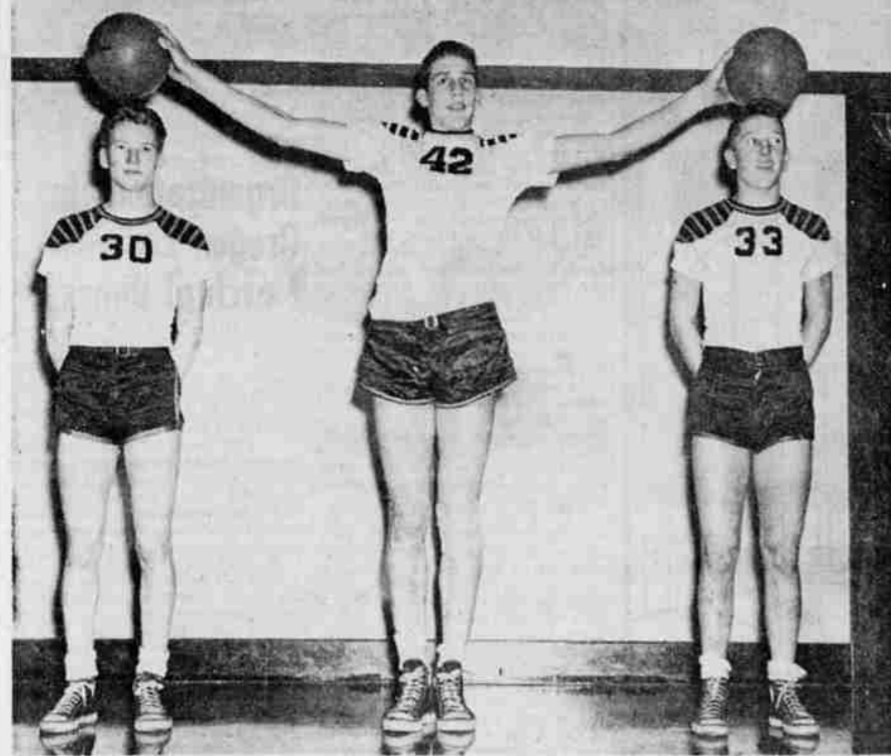

The Junior High Paposes defeated Grants Pass freshmen, 31-19 in a league game at Grants Pass Friday night. Coach Hod Turner's quintet grabbed a fast lead and was never headed.

Top-Notch Boxers Slated in Army Card for Jan. 14

In keeping with his promises to provide local boxing fans with the best available talent, Promoter Ernie Nazelrod has done some lifting of fighters in the card scheduled for the Roseburg Army Friday night, Jan. 14.

Originally scheduled to meet in the six-round semi-final, Pinky Cowan, Spokane, an excellent welterweight well-known to Roseburgers since his last encounter here, will fight Dick Wolf, Portland, in the six-round special. Nazelrod reports Wolf has been winning most of his encounters around Portland and in Washington.

The semi-final will feature Billy Pappas, pride of Salt Lake City, who opposed Lou Nova, contender for Joe Louis' heavyweight crown. Pappas has been engaging leading heavyweights and is considered one of the better ones himself. He is known to have a lot of "ring savvy" and experience.

"We've been trying to get him for a long time," promoter Nazelrod said, "and we finally made the grade." Pappas will meet Bob Hagen, from Sweden. Hagen hasn't been in the country long, but of the few fights he's had since arriving here, he hasn't lost a battle. Nazelrod reports Hagen is considered a "rugged boy."

The main event will bring Joey Ortega, lightweight champion of Oregon and Red Garrison, who fought a main-go in Spokane recently, drawing a crowd of 8,000, in what is expected to be a pending on him to beat Ortega so he can meet Kenny Lindsey, lightweight champion of Canada in a future match here.

The six-round preliminary will feature Roseburg's own pride and joy, Bob Nazelrod. Currently young Nazelrod is working out at the Senior High gymnasium, getting in shape to meet Sonny Gertman of Spokane. Gertman has a record of several pro-fights and is considered a clever boy who punches hard. SEATTLE, Jan. 8 — (AP) — Al Hostak, twice king of the middle-weights, stood figuratively today on Oregon's Jack Snapp to get a better look down the long, hard comeback trail.

Thin-haired and just turned 33, Hostak resembled his younger self as he lashed out with a dynamite-laden left to floor the Klamath Falls contender five times and administer the coup de grace in 1:50 of the ninth round.

The two met in the scheduled 10-round main event of a fight card here last night. Hostak weighed in at 165, Snapp at 163. The victory was the bubble in Hostak's brew, and avenged a 10-round decision he dropped to Snapp in Portland last year. It was the Seattle slugger's only loss since he left military service.

After a slow first round, Snapp was saved by the Bell as Hostak caught him in the second with a left flush to the jaw. The Oregonian was dumped for another nine-count in the fifth and was saved again by the bell in the eighth.

Falling back on an old jinx, W.S.C. nudged Oregon last night at Pullman, Wash., 46 to 43, while Oregon State's Beavers were staying off a late rally to trim Washington, 52 to 50, at Seattle.

Last year it was two-point trouble the Oregon Ducks were having against W.S.C. They lost three times by that margin or a lower one.

It was opening night in division play for all except Oregon, which broke even in two games earlier in the week with Idaho. The four clubs renew hostilities tonight on the same courts.

The Beavers piled up a 14 point lead before Washington got into the swing of things and the O.S.C. halftime advantage was 29-21. Then Sammy White began to click for the Huskies and once the margin narrowed to 46-45, Oregon State stalled out the final minute. White led the scoring with 18 points.

Exactly the same halftime score was recorded at Pullman, with W.S.C. having the margin. Oregon, too, shaved the edge to a single point, but Guard Bob Elliott dropped a long toss to give the Cougars enough to win.

Stanford defeated U.C.L.A., 61-52 at Palo Alto last night and the California Bears dropped a 37-52 overtime decision in Berkeley to U.S.C. in opening games of the Southern Division.
