Dorazio, Former Heavy, Is Booked for Homicide PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 8.—(AP)—A 33-year-old brewery worker died early today in the woman's homeopathic hospital and police arrested former Heavyweight Boxer Bus Dorazio on a homicide charge. The dead man is Albert Blomeyer. Detectives James Jartin and Thomas Blong said Blomeyer suffered fatal injuries after a fight. The detectives quoted the 31-year-old Dorazio—who once fought and lost to champion Joe Louis—as saying "People have been taunting me. They called me punch-drunk. They'd call me up on the 'phone just to heckle me." Dorazio served a year in federal prison as a World War Two draft dodger.

Belloise Beats Game Frenchman Villemain NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—(AP)—Robert Villemain, 1574, is a 100 per cent game Frenchman but he can't punch hard enough to rate as a middleweight title threat. That was the ringside consensus at Madison Square Garden last night after he lost a decision to Steve Belloise, 1591 in a bloody 10-rounder. It was the first defeat for the stocky Frenchman in 35 pro starts. Villemain caught the fancy of the crowd of 11,863 who paid \$35.95 to see his American debut. Blood streamed from wide cuts around both eyes but he refused to sag. Instead he carried the attack to his older opponent in the late rounds. The street cars, trolley coaches and buses of America carried 25 times as many passengers last year as the nation's railroads.

Fairs Assn. Would Drop Federal Tax PORTLAND, Jan. 7.—(AP)—The Oregon Fairs Association wants the federal admission tax dropped for county fairs. The association, now in its annual meeting here, passed a resolution to that effect yesterday, after a lively discussion. Proponents won after explaining they wanted to eliminate the tax only on "outside" admission gates. The association also demanded a change in apportionment of state racing funds. President Herman H. Chindgren said big fairs, like the State Fair at Salem, get the first dollars the state receives from the races. The resolution demanded that county fairs also get their portion of the funds "from the outset." There was discussion of a plan to place all county fair racing under complete jurisdiction of the State Racing Commission. Some objections were voiced, and no action was taken.
