

Kiser, LaBelle Win Bouts on Weekly Wrestling Card

Popular Jack Kiser of Portland was awarded the \$250 purse in the main go and clever Rene La Belle took home the \$50 purse in the semi-windup at the Roseburg wrestling arena Saturday night, after an initial battle royal, in which six stalwarts of the mat art assembled in the ring and went at it—all at once.

It was one of those nightmares Referee Elton Owen would rather not go through every Saturday night. First man to get pinned in the six-man merry-go-round was Coast Lightweight Champ Tex Hager and a short time later "Meanie" S to cky Nielsen went the way of most bad men—after four good "cleanses" got through romping on him.

Then it was La Belle's turn to wind up on the carpet and get waved aside by Referee Owen, followed by Tarzan Zimba. These two came back for a 30-minute one-fall go. The first two out received hamburger money and train fare home.

Kiser and Herb Parks, muscular lar semi-"meanie," who replaced Jack O'Reilly, the sensational young Australian, were the last two men on their feet in the free-for-all, making them opponents in the 30-minute, one-fall main go.

Zimba loses on fouls quickly on the friendly Frenchman, grabbing him by the hair and throwing La Belle across the ring. After a steady diet of this, the Frenchman got good and mad. He climbed up on the ropes, jumped off, and laid a drop kick into the rough Zimba.

Tarzan recovered and continued to foul La Belle by hair pulling plus other sundry off-color tricks. Referee Owen decided this type of tactics had gone far enough, so he awarded the match to La Belle. Zimba couldn't see that kind of a decision, and started to tell Owen so, by applying a headlock to the referee's cranium.

Owen retaliated with a couple

of solid blows to Tarzan's kisser and La Belle was awarded the purse.

The main go was sparked with much action, with Kiser giving Parks a bad time by applying a knee to the Canadian's chin. The crowd roared its approval. Kiser then got a painful full Nelson on Parks, followed by a couple of drop kicks, that sent Parks outside the ropes.

Parks returned with a couple of hard-butts, putting Kiser into the ropes. Parks then put a knee into Kiser's groin, which doubled the Portlander, and made him mad. He laid into Parks with flying fists and the "meanie" again took to the ropes. The crowd roared approval.

Parks continued to use dirty tactics, and Referee Owen decided to illustrate "crime doesn't pay," by awarding the match to Kiser, but Owen was adamant.

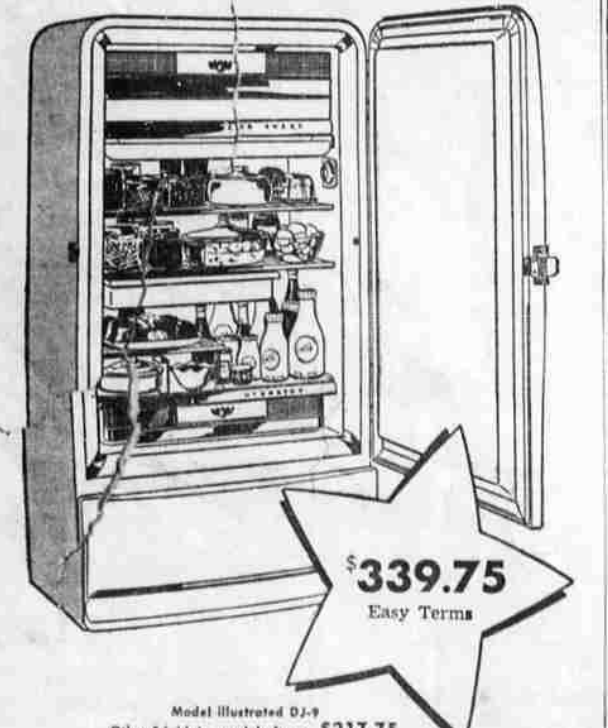

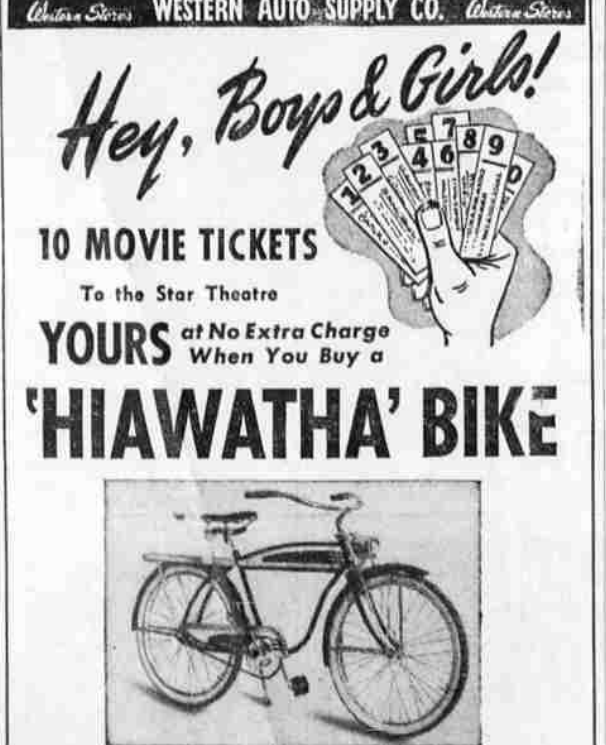
