Percy E. Stobie Of Camas Valley Dies

Percy Everett Stobie, 36, well-known resident of Camas Valley and veteran of World War II, died suddenly at his home there Jan. 8.

He was born at Marion, Ore., Feb. 4, 1912, and had spent most of his life at Camas Valley. He served with the allied forces during World War II and since that time had been engaged as a boiler operator in road construction work.

Survivors include seven brothers and sisters: Mrs. Violet Martindale, Camas Valley; Mrs. Eula D. Endicott, Eugene; John Stobie, McKenzie Bridge, Ore.; Floyd Stobie, Roseburg; Robert Stobie, Camas Valley; Millard Stobie, Brockway; and Howard Stobie, North Bend, Ore.

Bids For New Methodist Church At Drain Stated

Working drawings have been completed and bids will be called soon for construction of a new Methodist Church at Drain, the Daily Journal of Commerce at Portland reported. Robert A. Miller of Portland is the architect.

Funds are on hand for the construction. Before work can start, the existing building will have to be moved from the site. Rev. William Nesbitt Byars is pastor.

Construction is to be of reinforced concrete piers with pumice block curtain wall. The roof will be open wood trusses over the nave and trussed rafters over the remainder of the building.

Features include a sanctuary with a recessed altar on a raised platform. There will be a communion rail extending from wall to wall. The choir and organ will be contained inside the sanctuary. Adjoining is a choir room which may be used as a family room for funerals.

There is to be an open truss nave having a seating capacity of 180, plus 40 on the balcony over the narthex. A sound-proof mother's room will be constructed in the rear of the nave. This room will have plate glass vision into the nave and is equipped with complete sanitary facilities.

Educational facilities will consist of six classrooms so arranged that they may be opened up into two larger rooms.

A generous social unit is incorporated in the design. In this unit is a pastor's office and study, a very complete kitchen and a social room with a large fireplace. A stage will be provided at one end of the room.

Provisions have been made for construction of a parsonage on the site in the future.

Former Roseburg Phone Girl Gives \$3,000 to Church

The Canyonville Community Methodist Church is in receipt this week of a check for \$3,000 from Mrs. Charles E. Barnhardt, the Myrtle Creek Mail reports.

The donation to be added to the church building fund is in memory of Mrs. Barnhardt's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Daniel E. Parsley, who lived in the community a number of years and who helped build the present church in 1860.

Mrs. Barnhardt, who is a cousin to Mrs. R. L. Couglar, Frank Sullivan, Miss Mollie Sullivan and Ernie Briggs of the community, was an active member of the Methodist Sunday school until she moved out of town at the age of 15.

Upon the death of her father, Mrs. Barnhardt (nee Edna Parsley) secured a position in the telephone office at Roseburg to which city she and her mother moved. Later she secured a position in the Portland exchange where she won a prize consisting of a trip to Hawaii.

She met Mr. Barnhardt in San Francisco and they were subsequently married in Seattle making their home in Charlotte, N. C., where Mrs. Barnhardt now lives.

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Employers Enjoyed From Hiring Workmen

Two Douglas County employers are enjoined from hiring any persons in hazardous occupations subject to the Workmen's Compensation Law, until they post deposits with the State Industrial Accident Commission. In decrees signed Saturday by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly.

The persons so enjoined are Clifford D. Losey, who must post at least \$75, and Harvey Dav-

port Harrison, doing business as Hardway Lumber Co., who must post at least \$100 with the commission before they employ workmen in hazardous work.
