Fire Destroys Feed Store Near Eugene

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 11.—(P)—The \$33,000 Madgen feed and seed store in the Glenwood district was destroyed by fire at noon yesterday despite the efforts of both Eugene and Springfield Fire Departments.

The fire was caused by an unidentified employee who attempted to thaw out frozen pipes with burning newspapers. The blaze completely destroyed the one-story sheetmetal building, but firemen managed to keep adjacent buildings from other than broken windows.

The store housed hay, grain and seed at the time of the blaze and it was reported that owner John Madgen of Springfield was covered by about 50 per cent insurance.
