

Non-Political Labor Law Action Urged by Morse

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11. — (AP) — Senator Morse (R-Ore.) yesterday urged both Democrats and Republicans to "throw political

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strategy out of the window" in writing new labor legislation. Morse asked for repeal of the present Taft-Hartley law and the substitution of a revised Wagner act which would give employers and labor the same "procedural rights."

"Employers are entitled to receive the same rights that labor enjoyed under the old Wagner Act," Morse told the senate. Labor unions want congress to repeal the Taft-Hartley act and replace it with the Wagner Act unchanged. Morse said they had no right to expect that.

He told the Democrats such action would alienate independent voters who would conclude "you have not been fair to the public interest."

Morse also criticized Republicans for pushing through the Taft-Hartley act, which he said failed to stop the costly West Coast maritime strike. That section provides for court action to block major strikes temporarily.

Senator Taft, one of the co-authors of the act, acknowledged that the section as finally agreed upon by the Senate Labor committee was not completely satisfactory to any member. He said the major problem was how far to go in the section, while still retaining the right of workers to strike.

He said that while the section had not succeeded in preventing the maritime strike, it had prevented other strikes which threatened a national emergency.
