

Semi-Windup Offers Two Hard Punchers

Pappas-Hagen Go Will Furnish Big Share Of Action on Friday Card

Packing as much interest as the main-go between Joey Ortega, Oregon light-weight champion, and Red Garrison, Spokane, will be the six-round semi-windup between heavyweights Billy Pappas and "Sweed" Bob Hagen, on Friday night's fight card at the Roseburg Armory.

Pappas is a rugged, tough individual who will take a punch any time to land one. He's had a lot of experience against some of the best heavyweights on the coast and has a string of 10-round main events to his record. Pappas is currently being groomed for a headliner in Spokane under the tutelage of promoter Chuck Haines. The 26-year-old, six-foot-tall, 180-pounder has campaigned in the east and middle west. Pappas fought Lou Nova in 1936. Nova, who was contender for Joe Louis' heavy-weight crown, cut Pappas' eye in the seventh round and the fight was stopped.

Currently campaigning in the west, Pappas is considered an ideal opponent for Hagen, a newcomer to the United States from Oslo, Norway. Hagen had quite a fighting career in the "old country." He fought in Oslo, Copenhagen, Brussels and Paris and came to this country with a fine reputation as a fighter. Since he's been here, Hagen won all his fights by the knockout route, with the exception of one contest which he took by a decision.

Hagen is regarded as a great "comer" and one of the best prospects in the northwest. The six-foot one-inch, 190-pound Scandinavian reportedly "hits like a mule."

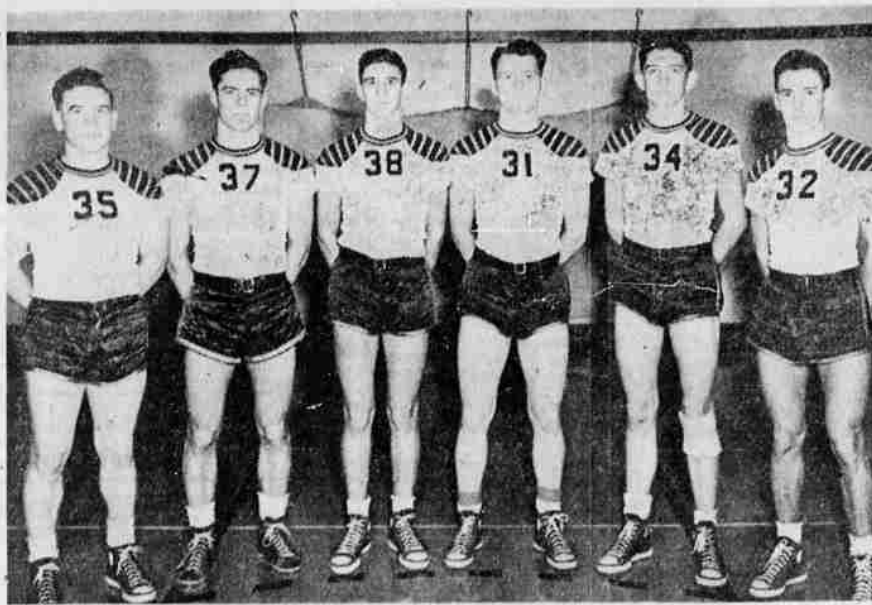

Four Indicted On Basketball Game Bribery Charges

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Four men were indicted yesterday on charges of attempting to bribe a player to "fix" college basketball games.

A New York County (Manhattan) grand jury indicted all four defendants, and a federal grand jury in Washington, D. C., indicted three of them.

The accused—all free on bail of \$20,000 each—are Jack Levy, 40, of Miami, Fla.; William Rivlin, 43; Joseph Aronowitz, 35, and Philip Klein, 34. The last three are from New York.

They have denied the charges since their arrest here last Tuesday night. They were accused by David Shapiro of New York, co-captain of the basketball team of George Washington University, Washington, of offering him a \$1,000 bribe to throw a game at Madison Square Garden that night.

The Washington indictments named Levy, Aronowitz and Klein. Assistant U. S. Attorney John W. Finley said the indictments were based on offers allegedly made to Shapiro last month in a Washington hotel. If convicted the defendants would be liable to a maximum of five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Conviction on the New York indictments could bring imprisonment from one to five years and a fine up to \$10,000.

Army Will Draft no Men In February and March

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—(AP)—The Army announces that it will draft no men in February and March.

It cancelled an original call for 3,000 men in February. Army Secretary Royall said that "voluntary enlistments and re-enlistments, averaging 35,000 a month for the past two months, have made selective service calls unnecessary for the next two months."

The Air Force and Navy have not used the draft system.

Israel Prepares Another Blast At British Attitude

Israel was reported preparing a new blast at Britain in the mounting tension of Palestine. Washington and United Nations officials both tried to beat down the bitterness.

Israel shot down five British planes near the Egyptian-Palestine border last week. The small state expressed chagrin that the British were moving troops in Trans-Jordan, bordering Palestine, and called this a "repudiation of the Security Council peace regulations." Britain and Trans-Jordan have a mutual assistance pact.

Israel and Egypt are scheduled to start armistice talks on the island of Rhodes tomorrow. The nationalistist Waftist party of Egypt offered to enter the Egyptian government under a non-party premier provided the present chamber of deputies remains unchanged until the end of summer.

Moscow newspapers made much of President Truman's huge budget requests. They pointed out that more than half the billions go to what the Russians said are "military purposes and financing of economic expansion of the United States abroad."

The Allied airlift started moving 1,500 seriously ill tuberculosis patients from Russian-blockaded Berlin. The Dena News Agency said the Russian head of a big tool factory at Chemnitz fled to western Germany to escape a return to Russia in custody of the dreaded secret police.

The cost of living in Belgium reached a level four times greater than before the war.

A Panama government spokesman said Panama has changed its mind and now is ready to cooperate with the United States in defending the canal. U. S. troops were pulled from bases in the little country a year ago because Panama objected.

Manual Aids Laymen In City Judicial Tasks

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 11.—(Special A)—Manual designed to aid the layman connected with city judicial work, has been mailed to municipal judges, police chiefs, and city attorneys of Oregon cities by the University of Oregon's bureau of municipal research and service.

"Municipal court procedures in Oregon" is the result of a joint project of the bureau and the 1947-48 municipal law committee of the Oregon state bar. As an aid to ex officio municipal judges such as city recorders, the manual covers the procedure in making arrests, procedures in court, appeals, an explanation of traffic court procedure, and other aids to the layman. The booklet also cites the various city charters which delegate certain police and judicial powers to municipal officers.

Lower Price Era Believed Nearing

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—(AP)—The rush of people attracted by post-Christmas sales has convinced many leading retailers the nation is headed for a new era of lower prices.

They voice this conviction with certain reservations, of course—and in some cases with crossed fingers. Right now some 6,000 retailers are attending the 38th annual convention of the National Retail Dry Goods Association in New York, and their main objective is to increase sales, lower their costs and maintain profits.

The general picture these leaders outline is this: Christmas sales bogged down until they barely exceeded last year's figures, and the year as a whole was only five per cent above 1947. But the response to sales at reduced prices indicate people will buy an increased volume of goods if price, style and value are balanced to fit the consumer pocketbook.

The experts don't look for a general price break, nor for a business recession, but they do look for a general selective downward price revision and a general increase in value and style where prices aren't reduced from present levels.

Mayor, City Council At Odds Over Police Chief
