

T-H Law Repeal Wanted First by Labor Heads

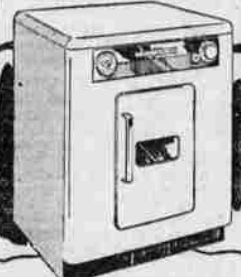
WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—(AP)—American Federation of Labor officials yesterday insisted anew that Congress repeal the Taft-Hartley law and restore the Wagner Act before considering new labor legislation.

House Democratic labor chiefs the Federation is vigorously opposed to so-called "one package" handling. Under that plan, Taft-Hartley repeal and Wagner Act re-enactment would be wrapped up in one bill with the changes President Truman wants in the Wagner measure.

The approach the AFL and CIO are urging calls for two bills. The first would wipe the Taft-Hartley law off the books and restore the old Wagner Act. The second bill would deal with the Wagner Act "improvements" Mr. Truman is seeking.

Neither the AFL nor the CIO has endorsed the changes proposed by the President.

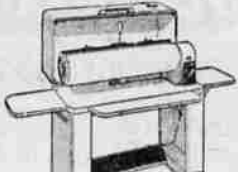

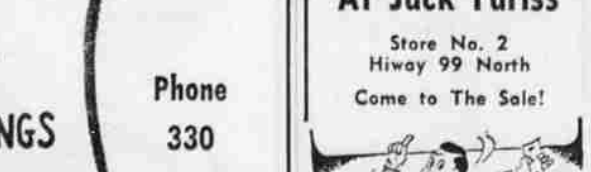

Civil Rights Program Faces Filibuster Threat

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—President Truman yesterday re-

ceived a citizens group backing his civil rights program and told them bills are being drafted to carry out his proposals.

While his group—the National Citizens Council on Civil Rights—was at the White House, Southern Democratic senators were meeting at the Capitol to discuss their strategy in fighting such measures as anti-job discrimination laws.

Senator Russell (D-Ga.) told reporters afterward that the 17 senators present agreed unanimously to oppose any unannounced change in senate rules which would bar a filibuster.

He said all the senators also voiced opposition "to the entire civil rights program" proposed by President Truman.

Second Execution Stay Granted Oregon Man

DENVER, Jan. 13.—Paul J. Schneider was granted a second stay of execution yesterday. The Oregon man received one this time from the State Supreme Court two days before his scheduled trip to the gas chamber for the murder of a Denver filling station operator, Frank J. Ford. The court ordered a stay until the week of April 10 to allow his attorney, J. Corder Smith of Fort Morgan, time to support contentions that Schneider's case involves points before the Supreme Court of the United States.

Less than a month ago, Schneider was reprieved by Governor Lee Kinsulter more than two hours before the first hour set for his execution. Yesterday, the governor told reporters, "I don't intend to intervene further in the case. The disposition is solely in the hands of the court."
