Church Group Will Ask Liquor Sale to Indians

BUCK HILL FALLS, Pa., Jan. 14.—(AP)—The 81st congress will be asked to permit Indians to purchase liquor off reservations. William Zimmerman Jr., acting Indian commissioner, told the home Missions Council, a Protestant inter-church group Wednesday that Congress also will be asked for a second time to approve a \$90,000,000 10-year rehabilitation program for Navajo Indians. Similar but less costly plans will be asked for other tribes, Zimmerman said.

The commissioner told the churchmen modification of the Indian liquor laws will be asked because "the present situation is hopeless, both as to enforcement

and as to encouragement of moderation in the use of liquor."

BID FOR TOURISTS

BEND, Ore., (AP)—Deschutes county plans to spend more this year, telling tourists about the delights of life here. A tentative advertising budget of \$6000 has been set up, well over the 1948 figure. The county advertising com-

mittee said that although tourist business was down about 10 per cent for Oregon last year, central Oregon had about the same volume as in 1947.

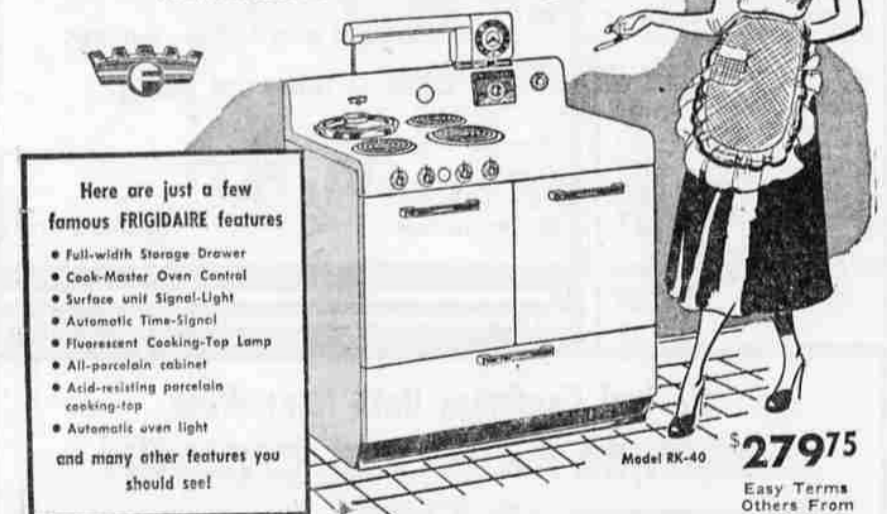
