

'Allies Only' Label Expected to Coax Sweden Off Fence

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—(AP) Officials expressed hope today that a new "Allies only" label on American arms will coax Sweden off the neutrality fence in the cold war against Russia.

State Department Press Officer Michael McDermott told a news conference yesterday that the United States cannot spare military equipment for nations unwilling to enter a defense alliance against Communist expansion.

Officials said that was aimed straight at Sweden, where press reports have taken the opposite attack. Sweden has suggested that her northern neighbors could shoulder western alliance bids and join her instead in a policy of strict neutrality.

The State Department followed up McDermott's statement with an announcement that last summer Sweden received 30 P-51 fighter planes which are no longer in operating condition but which can be used to replace parts in planes the Swedes already own.

Stockholm reports said earlier this week that Sweden had urged Norway and Denmark to spurn the projected North Atlantic military alliance for an iron-clad Scandinavian military pact. In any case, Sweden indicated, she would remain aloof from the treaty being negotiated by the United States, Canada and five European nations.

At a meeting of the Yoncalla Union High School Board this week, low bid for a \$200,000 bond issue offered by the board, to finance a new high school, was jointly submitted by the Drain Branch of the United States National Bank of Portland, Atkinson Jones and Company, Blyth

and Co., Inc., and Chas. N. Tripp Co. George Edes, school clerk, stated that the bond holders will pay at the rate of \$100.28 for each \$100 face value, together with secured interest to date of delivery.

The Bank of Cottage Grove submitted bids at 31 percent interest. Construction of the new school, which will be built just south of town, will start in the near future, according to the High School Board.

the situation grew worse. The South African air force was held in readiness to move in extra police. Five radio cars and 100 policemen already have been sent from Pretoria by air.

Before the new flareup in the suburbs, the district police commander for Durban said the police and military and naval personnel had the situation well in hand. It was the first time South African military units have been summoned to help quell racial violence.

Whole streets of stores and houses have been burned down or looted. Hundreds are destitute or homeless. The rioting broke out Thursday, when a young native boy was injured by an Indian market peddler. He was taken to a hospital and reports spread that he had been killed.

The incident snowballed into wholesale native attacks on the Indians. Whole families were slain in their homes. By the time the armed forces quelled the rioting in the city, it had spread to the suburbs.

STUDENTS INJURED

SEATTLE, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Seven University of Washington students were injured today as fire swept through the Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity house. Several of the fraternity men were injured when they jumped from second-floor windows. Eight or nine others escaped the burning structure by breaking windows in the second-floor dormitory and sliding down downspouts.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 15.—(AP)—A "strictly business" marriage unfolded today for a wealthy wheel-chair-bound widow, 90, and her Negro chauffeur, 28.

After three judges and a minister had refused to tie the unusual matrimonial knot, Mrs. Adriana Eugenie Nicholson and her chauffeur-cook of seven years, Alfred Lee Gustard Woods, were wed last night by a Negro pastor.

The Rev. M. Frederick Mitchell, pastor of the Cosmopolitan Christian Church, performed the ceremony in the parlor of his home. The elderly bride, bedecked with gardenias, was wheeled to the ceremony. After it was performed, Woods told reporters: "This is not a love match, it's strictly business."

Mrs. Nicholson earlier observed: "This is to be more of a contract than a marriage. I want him to have my property when I die."

er called a ten minute recess to give the committee an opportunity to formulate the rules for the session and at the conclusion of that time, like a miracle, the House was presented with nine or ten pages of carefully prepared rules. The illusion was that that had been achieved in a very short period. I suppose some visitors had no conception of the fact that that committee had labored for many long hours, in fact far into the nights long before Jan. 10. Since Paul is vice-chairman of that committee, (with W. W. Chadwick of the Chadwick hotels as chairman) I was aware of the amount of time involved in preparing a set of rules which would be efficient and also acceptable to the members.

The election of the Speaker was just as smooth. Of course the election was unanimous and probably the only surprising thing about it was when my husband in making the speech seconding the nomination of Frank Van Dyke, instead of enumerating his perfection in noble terms, chose instead to describe one or two of his college pranks, illustrating to what achievements Speaker Frank has reached in overcoming the "devilishness" of those days. Anyhow everyone voted for him so I guess it was alright.

The inauguration of the new governor is quite a pageant and I still shudder when I think how nearly I missed it. The House was "at ease" while waiting for the Senate to arrive so I stepped out to try and locate our guests who were also late. Imagine my

horror to find the door locked and the doorkeeper inside and the only way we managed to get back in was by ducking in after the Senate when those august gentlemen were escorted in to their places of honor.

One interesting little part of the ceremony consists of the President of the Senate requesting the Speaker of the House to canvass the election and determine who has been elected Governor of the State of Oregon.

Naturally no one seemed particularly surprised when a few moments later Speaker Van Dyke announced that he had determined that Douglas McKay had been duly elected Governor of the State. A good many of the legislators laughingly accused Governor McKay and former Governor Hall of plagiarizing each other.

Everyone seems to be determined to hasten this session and waste absolutely no time on trivialities. Following the inauguration, the House convened for perhaps ten minutes at which time the first three House Bills—of which you are reading in the papers—were introduced and promptly the members suspended the rules and then were read a second time and sent to committee for consideration and investigation. If you are not aware of the procedure, the rules call for the title of a Bill to be read two times, the second time on the succeeding day, and after that formally sent to the committee most nearly concerned with them where the real work is done. Had the rules not been suspended another day would have elapsed before the committees could get their hands on these bills and course a day wasted at the beginning probably means more time tacked on at the end of the session. (The third reading comes later.)

Well, I could go on at great length about various new and unusual experiences here but this would be entirely too much to begin with so I'll accumulate them for another time.
