### Tires With Treads Not Superior On Slick Highways

Contrary to popular belief, tires with good treads will not stop a car any quicker than smooth tires on hard-packed snow or firm ice, according to a report received by Secretary of State Newberry.

Skidding tests recently completed by the National Safety Council's committee on winter driving hazards emphasized that even tires with abrasive particles imbedded in the tread are no help in cold temperatures on dry ice. Where the ice is melted, however, abrasive tires will do better than ordinary treads, and good treads are better than smooth, the report affirmed.

In their best performance, the abrasive type of tire still required 161 feet to stop a car from a speed of 20 miles an hour, compared to a normal 21 feet on dry concrete.

Tire chains reduced passenger car braking distance from 40 to 50 percent, but officials found no advantage in the use of rubber tire chains on the ice. The tests showed the "quiet" chains actually increased skidding distance.

Severe weather conditions prevailing throughout the state make it imperative for Oregon drivers to review winter safety practices, Newberry said, since "know-how" behind the wheel often means the difference between safety and injury on slippery roads.

He listed as most important things to remember: Making gradual starts and stops, leaving plenty of room between vehicles, and reducing speeds to meet conditions.
