

# R. H. S. Cagers Victors Over Myrtle Creek

Indians Rally in Fourth Period to Overtake Foe And Win by Eight Points

Scoring 17 counters in the last period, the Roseburg Indians pulled ahead to win 45-40 in a basketball game against a threatening Myrtle Creek team at Myrtle Creek Tuesday night.

The end of the third period saw Roseburg down by a 35-31 tally, after barely keeping ahead of the Vikings up to the half. The first quarter ended with Roseburg on top 9-8, and at the half, the Indians led by an 18-17 squeeze.

But Shirliff and Arlen Weaver sparked the Viking threat, but it was the backboard work of Daryl Blank and Clint Agge that helped turn the trick. They also excelled in jump and pivot shots.

The game was rough and 50 fouls were chalked up before the final gun sounded. Agge, Daryl Blank and Bob Schindler were benched with five personals each, while Hanna, Brown, Shirliff and Weaver, four of Myrtle Creek's starting five, were retired on personals.

On the free throw line, the Indians connected with 14 out of 36, while Myrtle Creek hit 11 out of 23 tries. The "standing room only" crowd was well satisfied with the thrill-packed tussle.

Neil Wissing, starting for Roseburg for the first time, did a good job and was "in there" every second he played. The entire squad looked "on the ball" in spite of the third period setback.

**K-Falls Next Foe**  
Friday and Saturday nights, the Indians play a two-game series with Klamath Falls on the Senior High court. The K-Falls crew is an outstanding club in the state, having only lost two games so far, neither of them league contests.

In a Klamath Falls Invitational tournament, they defeated three top teams in the state, including Astoria and Pendleton. Eight veterans from last year's state tournament team will be here to oppose the local quintet. The Klamath Falls team placed fifth in the state tournament at Eugene last year and will be in fine form this weekend.

## New Regulations Applied To Umpqua River Contain Good, Bad Provisions for Anglers

Good news and bad comes to Umpqua River anglers from the State Game Commission.

Announcing tentative regulations for 1949, the commission states its intention to declare complete closure of the spring chinook salmon season, except in tide water, where these species do not respond to sports lure; reports plans to close the trout season a month earlier than last year, and to eliminate the special bag limit for jack salmon, which henceforth must be included in over-all catch.

On the good side of the report is the announced plan to permit two fish over 12 inches in length as a winter limit, and an extensive protection and propagation program designed to restore salmon runs.

Tentative 1949 angling regulations call for opening the season on trout not less than six inches, above The Forks, May 1. The season will continue through Sept. 30. The legal limit between tide water and The Forks will be trout not less than eight inches in length, starting May 1. In the tide water area, trout season will not open until June 15 and an eight-inch limit will be in effect throughout the full season. The eight-inch rule is applied to permit larger escapement of seaward migrations of steelhead trout and fingerling salmon. The Game Commission reports its studies of this practice, initiated three years ago, to be showing good results.

**Winter Rules Prescribed**  
Oct. 1 through Feb. 28, fishing will be open for trout, 12 inches or more, steelhead and salmon with a two-fish limit in the North Umpqua, below The Narrows, exclusive of tributaries; the South Umpqua, below Jackson Creek, exclusive of tributaries; the main Umpqua, below The Forks, Elk and Calapoon Creeks; west of Highway 99, Mill Creek and tide water. The season for fall salmon fishing in the area described above will open Sept. 1. Salmon not less than 20 inches must be taken in tide water of the Umpqua below the highway bridge at Redfish and in the tide water of Smith River the year round.

Heretofore jack salmon have not been counted in trout or salmon bag limits, but 1949 rules on the Umpqua will include them with the trout limit of 10 fish. Bag limits of salmon and steelhead over 20 inches must be counted in the aggregate at all times, including the annual bag.

In a preliminary game, the Jayvee reserves battled to a 32-17 decision over the Yoncalla Junior Varsity.

The Warriors ran up a 13-7 first quarter score on buckets by Mathews, Briggs, Sconce and Strickling and advanced to a half-time score of 22-17. In the third period, Yoncalla put on a hot rally, but the Roseburg quint smothered it and came out on top at the end of the period, 35-23. The Warriors outscored the Yoncalla team in the final quarter to win by a good-sized margin.

Buddy Mathews got hot for Roseburg and poured 18 counters through the hoop to lead all scoring of the evening. Fast of Yoncalla scored 12 points to lead the point parade for his team. The reserve game was Roseburg all the way, with the Yoncalla quint never gaining a lead throughout the contest. The Roseburg five led at halftime, 13-8, and at the end of the third period, 24-8. Gordon Conley, Roseburg forward, led the scoring with 12 counters.

**Buddy Baer's Suit Ends in Mistrial**

**FREEHOLD, N. J., Jan. 19.**—(AP)—The suit of former heavyweight boxer Buddy Baer for \$150,000 auto accident damages ended yesterday when Superior Court Judge Thomas Brown declared a mistrial.

Defense Counsel Theodore J. La Brecque, of Red Bank, made three motions to declare a mistrial on the grounds that "the judge's remarks are prejudicial to the case and are depriving my clients of a fair trial."

Brown denied the motions. Then the judge himself declared a mistrial, saying "it seems to me the jury could not help but be affected one way or another."

Baer contended in his action that injuries to his right shoulder and arm "hampered him greatly" in his fight with Joe Louis 16 days after the accident. Louis knocked out Baer in the first round.

The accident occurred in Easton, Monmouth County, on Dec. 24, 1941.

Defendants named in Baer's suit were Wellington H. Wilkins Jr., and his wife, Wilma, of Little Silver.

**Dade Decisions Clems; Kahut, Culbertson Draw**

**SEATTLE, Jan. 19.**—(AP)—In a battle marked by heavy infighting, Harold Dade of Los Angeles, former bantamweight champion, scored a 10-round decision over Joey Clems of Portland last night.

Both weighed 127 pounds. Heavyweights Dutch Culbertson of Los Angeles and Joe Kahut of Woodburn, Ore., fought a draw in the 10-round co-feature. The crowd, estimated at 10,000, thought Culbertson had the edge, and hooted the verdict.

In a 10-round semi-windup, Mack Jackson, 165, of Fort Lewis, drew with Bernie Reynolds, 165, of Bellingham. Reynolds is a protégé of ex-middleweight champ Freddie Steele.
