

Papooses Win At Myrtle Creek

Hod Turner's Papooses defeated Myrtle Creek, 41-18, in a preliminary to the Indian-Viking basketball tilt at Myrtle Creek on Tuesday night.

Bag Percentage High In Special Deer Season

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Jan. 19.—(AP) A State Game Commission report said that 93 percent of the hunters were successful in a special deer season at Silver Lake, Dec. 18-22.

W. C. Lightfoot, commission agent, said 600 permits were issued, 458 hunters checked into the area, and 430 checked out with deer. Each was allowed one deer without antlers. Lightfoot said 72 percent taken were mature and 28 percent were fawns.
