Freed Convict Faces Further Law Action

ALBANY, Ore., Jan. 19. —(AP)—Linn County District Attorney Melvin Goode is going to try to cut short the freedom of Albert Leroy Moore.

Moore was one of the state convicts freed by former Gov. John Hall in his last days in office. Goode said Moore had been convicted on four separate burglary counts and he would ask the court to commit the ex-convict to the state prison for life as an habitual criminal.

Goode said Moore had been convicted on two counts in Baker County in 1940 and on two in Linn County in 1945.

Raid Tipped-Off, Sheriff At Portland Explains

PORTLAND, Jan. 19. —(AP)—A tip-off to tavern operators crippled the effectiveness of last week's raids on poolhalls and slot machines. Multnomah County's new sheriff charged.

Sheriff Marion L. Elliott, appearing before a civic group for the first time since assuming office, said he is investigating the "leak" and that he probably will have more to say about it later.

Czechs Oppose Red Rule But Revolt Improbable

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19. —(AP)—Arnost Heldrich, excited Czech diplomat, estimated yesterday that 93 per cent of the Czechoslovakian people oppose the Communist regime that rules them. Heldrich, until recently secretary general of the Czech foreign office, ruled out any chance for a successful revolt now, however.

"Opposition is impossible except from the outside, and through a limited underground," he told a reporter.

Phone Training Program for Vets Gets VA Approval

A partial victory for World War II veterans in job training with the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. in Oregon was reported this week by the state Department of Veterans' Affairs, which said the Veterans Administration central office in Washington, D. C., had approved the first two years of the phone company training program.

Last-minute VA approval thus nullified a state apprenticeship council decision of last November disapproving the program because it did not meet state standards, and assures continued receipt of GI subsistence payments by nearly 300 veterans training for skilled jobs with the phone concern in Oregon, the state veterans' department said.

Regional VA officials in Portland said December subsistence checks were mailed these veterans immediately following central office's action.

Despite the surprise decision by VA, which ordinarily gives state agencies final say on GI training courses, the Oregon veterans' department intimated that efforts will be continued to seek four-year approval.

This would, according to William F. Gaevrenstrom, state veterans' affairs director, enable an additional 500 veterans employed by the company to receive GI subsistence. Under the two-year setup just approved by VA they are denied GI benefits, the director said, because they are in their third and fourth years of the training program.

The veterans' agency's December "Oregon Veterans' News Letter" said the apprenticeship council rejected the program because the company refused to give labor equal voice in administering the program.

The news letter then cited an opinion of Attorney General George Neuner, handed down in October, authorizing approval in such cases, where only veterans were involved.

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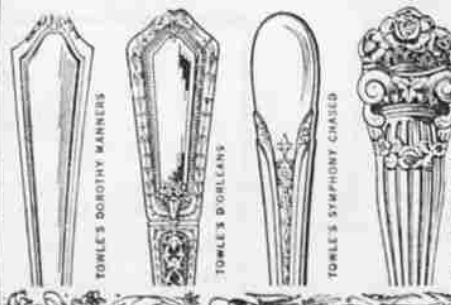
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Charm Chat
