

Commie Trial Judge Refuses To Disqualify Self

NEW YORK, Jan. 20. (AP)—Federal Judge Harold R. Medina yesterday refused to disqualify himself and his colleagues from hearing arguments of attorneys for top Communist leaders against New York's jury-picking system.

The ruling came after the jurist had heard an entire morning of arguments against himself and his fellow judges in the Southern District of New York.

The trial of the 11 Communist Party officials on charges of working for the forcible overthrow of the government thus inched ahead at the slow pace it has maintained since it began Monday.

In their arguments, the defense attorneys maintained all judges in this district had acquiesced in the present method of selecting jurors and thus should be disqualified from hearing the defense motions for discharge of the jury panel.

The defense insists the method of jury selection here is biased, with low-income and minority groups largely excluded.

In opening the defense attack on the jury-picking system, attorney Richard Gladstein of San Francisco declared:

"Here in this Courthouse the jury system has been captured by Wall Street and Park Avenue—captured by court attaches with the silent acquiescence of every judge of this court."

Defense maneuvers have taken up almost the entire proceedings since the trial started Monday.

Government prosecutors won a major legal skirmish Tuesday when Federal Judge Harold R. Medina granted a request—over heated defense objections—that the trial of W. Z. Foster, 67, and suffering from a heart ailment, be separated from that of his 11 colleagues.

DETROIT, Jan. 20. (AP)—A brash boy of 15 took on a drug store robber in a gun duel Tuesday night.

Accounts to police indicated the boy, Eugene Newsom, a high school junior, might have won.

A pistol-waving, "surly" fellow, wearing an improvised mask walked into the store in early evening. He ordered Mrs. Genevieve Baumgartner, 48, proprietress, and two customers into a back room.

Then he forced Eugene, a clerk, to give him \$135 from the cash register and told the boy to join the others.

Despite Mrs. Baumgartner's "don't, it isn't worth it," Eugene snatched up a hidden revolver, slipped out the back door, and was crouching behind a truck as the robber emerged from the store.

Eugene fired five shots and the robber two. The boy was unhurt but he said he saw his adversary double up and scream in pain as he fled to his car and drove off.

Reds' Advance Driving Foreigners From China

SHANGHAI, Jan. 20. (AP)—This great Chinese city, built largely by foreigners into one of the showplaces of Asia, soon will have only a handful of foreigners left.

The steamer Captain Markos, chartered by the International Refugee Organizations, left yesterday with 660 refugees bound for many places.

Last week the Chinese steamer Hwalien took 497 White Russians to the Philippines. They are the first of at least 6,000 stateless persons going to Samar Island.

Meanwhile, foreign ship and plane takes more refugees out, some paying their own fare and some financed by the IRO.

Whatever else the Communists may do to China, it is certain they are drastically reducing the number of foreign residents, who once totaled 60,000 in Shanghai alone.

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Roseburg Twins Reach Grandparents in N. Y.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Jan. 20. (AP)—A tiresome transcontinental air journey for Mary and Irene Neal, 20-month-old motherless twins, ended here yesterday when the youngsters were claimed by their grandparents.

"Gosh, they're bigger than I thought they'd be," exclaimed Grandpa Frank McDonald as he greeted the blue-eyed youngsters with a welcoming hug and kiss at the airport.

"They'll be running all over the place," he observed.

The twins began their flight Monday from Medford Ore. McDonald and his wife plan to raise the children on their 300-acre dairy farm at nearby Moravia.

Irene and Mary were in the care of Miss Virginia Waller, American Airlines stewardess. They were placed aboard a plane by their father, Carlos Neal of Roseburg, Ore.

The mother of the babies, the former Marion McDonald, died about 10 months ago.

Truman Orders Inquiry Into Airlines Dispute

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20. (AP)—President Truman yesterday ordered an emergency board set up to investigate a dispute between Northwest Airlines, Inc. and some of its employees.

The controversy involves the carrier and certain workers represented by the International Association of Machinists, an independent union.

The union yesterday notified the company a strike has been called for Jan. 24 at 6 a. m. The dispute centers on wage de-

mands made by the union in negotiations for a new labor contract. The union asks an increase of 16 cents an hour for the approximately 1,700 mechanics and service workers the contract would cover. The company has offered a boost of 4 to 5 cents.
