

Weather Idles Lumber Workers in Eugene Area

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 20.—(P)—Weather conditions more than

power shortage threaten to keep more than 1,000 lumber workers idle in this area.

The majority of sawmills generate their own power and only

those with Mountain States Power hookups in the Springfield area have been forced to shut down upon occasion.

Snow yesterday and a threat of increasing cold weather will

close many of the mills that resumed operations Tuesday. Log haulers are not operating and only mills with stocked ponds and cold decks of logs can keep operating.

New York's Idle Draws Pay While Loafing in Miami

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 19.—(P)—More than 1,000 New Yorkers are loafing in Miami and getting up to \$26 a week from the state.

These persons qualify for benefits under the New York unemployment insurance law because they have satisfied the state they are ready and able to work at their vocations in Florida but can't find employment there.

Among them are hotel and store workers, orchestra players and others who normally are employed in resort areas.

The state division of Placement and Unemployment Insurance has

four examiners and an investigator stationed in Miami to check claims.

Their job is to speed up payments of legitimate claims and to tab phonies. The division has no estimate of the amount of money saved as a result of its Florida operation.

Last year at this time, about 2,000 New Yorkers in Miami were receiving a total of approximately \$40,000 a week in benefits.

Last week there were 1,500 claimants and 1,000 received a total of approximately \$22,000.

The claimant must show he is both ready and able to work. Benefits run from \$10 to \$26 a week, for a maximum of 26 weeks.

The state now has a national total of more than 1,500,000 claimants. Of these, 455,000 are in New York state.

Beloved Pengpu Bridge Blown up by Troops

NANKING, Jan. 20.—(P)—The bridge the people of Pengpu loved so well has been blown up.

With it went 30 residents, killed by debris.

Government troops blew the bridge before withdrawing from Pengpu to keep the Communists from using it to cross the river Hwai.

Three weeks ago the people of Pengpu argued loud and long against demolition of the bridge.

They said it belonged not to the government, not to the Communists—but belonged to Pengpu.

Before it was built Pengpu was but a mud village. Commerce opened by the bridge boomed.

Pengpu into a city of 250,000. But the government troops were adamant. The bridge had to go, they said. When the bridge went, so did the morale of Pengpu.

A newspaper said the city's shops were looted when the government troops went south.

Murder Conviction of Youth, 13, is Reversed

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Jan. 20.—(P)—The Illinois Supreme Court yesterday reversed the conviction of Howard Lang, 13, youngest

murder defendant in Chicago history. The court ordered a new trial.

Lang was sentenced to 22 years in prison for the slaying in October 1946, of Lonnie Fellick, his seven-year-old playmate. Lang confessed he stabbed the youngster and crushed his head with a heavy rock.

The Supreme Court said that Lang from the outset indicated that his defense would be temporary insanity but that the prosecution had not established his capacity to commit the crime.

Lang's attorney contended the guilty plea was entered with the understanding that the youngster would be sent to a trade school or other training institution for rehabilitation.

Two Key ECA Officials Tender Resignations

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—(P)—Two key officials of the Economic Cooperation Administration, Deputy Administrator Howard Bruce and Information Director Bryant Houston, have filed

registrations, it was disclosed today.

An ECA spokesman said that Bruce, 69, retired Baltimore banker and industrialist, asked to be relieved on January 31. Bruce originally took the post with the understanding that he would be free to leave after January 1.

Houston, former vice president of the Pepsi Cola Corporation, is leaving within a day or two to become vice president of a New York advertising firm. No successor has been chosen.

Crash Injures Woman On Way to Ailing Mother

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 20.—(P)—Mrs. May Nelson of Yuba City, Calif., was critically injured in an automobile accident on U. S. 97 south of here yesterday as she was rushing to the bedside of her 91-year-old mother in Eugene.

Mrs. Nelson was in the back seat of a sedan driven by her son, Edgar Nelson, when the car failed to

make a curve on the Southern Pacific overpass near Midland and struck the guard rails. She suffered a brain injury.

State police said that Mrs. Nelson and members of her family were enroute to Eugene where Mrs. Mary Lovejoy, mother of Mrs. Nelson, lies critically ill with pneumonia in Sacred Heart Hospital.

Fluffy Scones

RECIPE: Mix and sift 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour, 3 tbs. sugar, 1 tsp. salt and 3 tbs. baking powder. Blend in 5 and 3 tbs. shortening. Mix 2 beaten eggs, 1/2 cup milk, stir into mixture. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead. Roll each 1/2" thick to fit 6" pie pan. Bake quarters, cutting nearly through dough. Brush with egg diluted with milk, bake in hot oven (450° F.) about 15 min. Portion, split, butter and fill with jam. Serve hot.
