

Correct List Of Committees Of City Council Given

Tuesday's News-Review carried an erroneous list of appointments to standing City Council Committees by Mayor Albert G. Flegel. The list, printed, due to a misunderstanding, was the 1948 Council Committees, instead of those for the new year.

The correct 1949 committee list follows: Aviation, George West; Chester C. Morgan and Harrison Winston; expenditure and ways and means (combined into one committee), Henry Carstens, Percy Croft and J. A. Hart; judiciary and elections, Winston, West and Hart; police and health, Frank Ashley, West and Hart; fire committee, W. J. "Bill" Adams, Croft and Winston. The first named in each instance is chairman of his respective committee.

The Planning Commission has one vacancy to be filled. The Park Commission is complete, with Croft to continue as chairman. Croft is also the Council representative on the library board and the reappointment of Ed Knapp completes this board. The Housing Commission and Budget Committee will be announced at the next Council meeting.

Brothers in Mountain Trek are Found Dead

DAVIS, W. Va., Jan. 20 — (AP) — The frozen body of nine-year-old Eston Carr was found in a mountainous Tuesday, completing the search for him and two other boys missing for a week.

The youngster's younger brother, Robert, 7, was found dead Monday. The third, 16-year-old John Helmick, was rescued Sunday but is in a critical condition with pneumonia.

The three lads left this mountain community last Tuesday to visit the Carr home about five miles away. A heavy fog, then snow, set in, and the boys apparently lost their way. Some 150 volunteers combed the rugged terrain day and night in hopes of finding them alive.

Robert, the youngest, had been dead only about two hours when searchers found him, authorities said.

Bids For New High School to be Asked Soon

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 19 — The Journal of Commerce today says: The school district of Oakland, Oregon, is expected to invite bids within a week for the construction of a new high school structure.

The Portland architectural firm of Freeman & Hayslip is now winding up copies of final plans and specifications for the project.

The proposed building will be an L-shaped structure with the front wing 74x177 feet, and the back wing 66x133 feet. It will be constructed on concrete slab on a gravel fill. Construction on the exterior will be cavity wall with the use of pumice block, pumice tile and brick veneer.

It will have trussed rafters with a solid roof sheathing and built-up roofing with mineral surface cap sheet.

The window openings will feature glass block with metal insert sash.

The interior will have frame partitions. The walls will be plastered. The ceilings in the corridors, lobby and library will have acoustical tile and the remainder fiber board. Asphalt tile will be used on the floors.

It will have low pressure steam heat with overhead warm air.

The building will house a principal's room, general room, vault and work room, conference and book room, a combination library and study, home making room, general science and chemistry room, a health room, teachers' room, typing room and two general classrooms.

The specifications are expected to include an alternate which will allow the contractor to also figure an addition to house physical education dressing rooms for boys and girls. The additional 25x81-foot section would connect to the smaller wing and would necessitate the construction of a 12x65-foot corridor.

Transportation Exhibit of GMC Opens in New York

NEW YORK, Jan. 20 — (AP) — General Motors Corporation put all its new transportation wares on exhibition yesterday for the first time in more than eight years.

The big million dollar show is called "Transportation Unlimited" and covers the truck, automobile, marine, railroad and aviation fields.

The center of attraction is the new Pontiac and Chevrolet lines, which are having their formal unveiling. Other G. M. cars have been introduced before, but special built Cadillacs, Oldsmobiles and Buicks are shown.

Neither of the two new lines have radical functional changes, but there are a number of engineering and styling changes to give more interior width and length together with greater riding and driving comfort.

Pontiac prices are up \$40 to \$60 over last year. Chevrolet prices are expected to be unchanged or slightly higher.

This is in line with statements earlier this week by Alfred P. Sloan Jr., chairman of the board, and C. E. Wilson, president, who said they expected production to be around 6,000,000 cars and trucks this year for the entire industry, with prices only slightly below last year and perhaps higher.

One attraction at the show is a new high compression automobile motor with a 12 to 1 compression ratio as compared to the present ratios of 7.5 to 1 or lower. This type of motor requires special fuel not yet on the general market, but increasing compression ratio is looked upon as one of the coming things in automobiles because of better performance and fuel saving.

Outside of the New York area some 16,000 dealers will have later public showings on varying dates.

Teamsters Union Wants Filling Station Men

CHICAGO, Jan. 20 — (AP) — The AFL Teamsters Union plans to organize all filling station workers in the nation and to steer business away from oil and gas-line dealers who don't show the union's shop card.

Dave Beck, executive secretary of the union, told newsmen the plan calls for the organization of between 100,000 and 150,000 filling station workers. Owners and mechanics would be excluded.

Beck said his union would "shut off its patronage" from all gasoline and oil dealers not displaying the union's shop card.

Organization of the filling station workers is part of the teamsters' drive for 1,500,000 new members.

Armed Forces Filled To Budget Allowance

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 — (AP) — The armed forces now have 1,621,000 men—all they will be allowed to pay under the 1950 budget. For the next 18 months they can only take recruits to fill expiring enlistments.

This was revealed when Secretary of Defense Forrestal released figures on the strength of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force.

COMEDIAN SUED

FORT WORTH, Tex., Jan. 20 — (AP) — Movie and stage comedian Hugh Herbert is being sued for divorce.

The petition filed here by Mrs. Rose Herbert said the comedian was "unkind and harsh" to her for a year before they separated Dec. 18, 1947.

They were married in Detroit in 1917 and have no children.
