

Democracy Tenets Upheld by Truman Against Red Isms

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—President Truman measured Communism and Democracy against each other in his inaugural speech in these words: "Communism is based on the belief that man is so weak and inadequate that he is unable to govern himself, and therefore requires the rule of strong masters."

"Democracy maintains that government is established for the benefit of the individual, and is charged with the responsibility of protecting the rights of the individual and his freedom in the exercise of his abilities."

"Communism maintains that social wrongs can be corrected only by violence. Democracy has proved that social justice can be achieved through peaceful change."

"Communism holds that the world is so divided into opposing classes that war is inevitable. Democracy holds that free nations can settle differences justly and maintain lasting peace."

Board Named to Probe Airlines' Labor Dispute

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—President Truman yesterday named the three members of an emergency board that will investigate threatened strikes against Northwest Airlines, Inc.

The three are former Senator Harry Schwartz of Wyoming, chairman; Aaron Horvitz, New York City lawyer; and Robert Boyd, Portland, Ore., attorney.

Approximately 2,250 members of the International Association of Machinists have threatened to strike against the airline to back up demands for wage increases.

The board was set up under provisions of the Railway Labor Act, which governs airline workers. The action automatically postponed any walkout for at least 60 days.

Revenge Slayer Taken Back to Oklahoma City. EL PASO, Tex., Jan. 22.—(AP)—"I'm glad it's all over," Roy Frank Godbey said as he started back to Oklahoma City yesterday to face a murder charge.

Godbey, an ex-convict, has admitted he shot lawyer Earl Pruitt at there 10 days ago out of revenge. He was captured here Wednesday.

"So long, everybody," he called as he departed for the automobile trip in custody of four Oklahoma City peace officers.

Leaders from approximately 24 western Oregon counties will meet in the Oregon State College Memorial Union building January 25, 26 and 27. Judging from past attendance at this annual three-day conference, Allen expects about 300 leaders to attend.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Can a blindfolded man tell the difference between butter and margarine? This question intrigued Britons today.

Dr. Edith Summerskill, deputy to the food minister, bets it can't be done. Her challenge, issued at an Oxford lecture last night, was taken up by an Oxford student named Colin Prestige.

"All over London, folk who read about the bet plucked tea shops to sell them a pat of butter and a pat of margarine to have a go."

Said a restaurant manager: "I think this young man stands at least an even chance of winning."

Doctor Summerskill gave Colin her private phone number and said "when you come to London ring me up and we'll have a test."

Colin took her up but wouldn't say when he'll be in town. His reward, promised by Dr. Summerskill if he wins, is a can of snook—an exotic South African fish she's been trying to promote as a substitute for salmon. What he pays if he loses isn't known.

Court Frees Indian On Plea of Abused Spouse. PORTLAND, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Probation of Royde Chocktoot, 48, Klamath Indian, was continued today by Federal Judge Claude McCulloch.

Chocktoot had appeared in court for revocation of probation under a charge of beating his wife and burning her clothes. His wife, in court today, said her husband had beaten her only once and she asked that he be released.

If you can stand those beatings, OK with me," Judge McCulloch said. "You can have him if you want him."

Chocktoot was put on probation in 1947 for arson.

Prescott Saved From Status of Ghost Town. ST. HELENS, Ore., Jan. 22.—(AP)—The newest city in Oregon is Prescott.

That's the Columbia County place near here that was expected to become a ghost town after a sawmill closed three years ago. Workers got jobs in other cities, but they couldn't move.

The housing shortage, you know. So they stayed on here and commuted. Then they wanted to buy the water system, operated by the Clark and Wilson Lumber Company when the mill was going.

There was, however, no legal organization to do the buying. So they counted noses, and found out they had 153 persons—three more than the number necessary to incorporate. Along with purchase of the water system, they intend to elect a mayor and city council.
