Cold Interrupts Transportation In Reedsport Area

Continued cold weather is providing the Reedsport area with some difficult problems, chief among them being that of transportation. The operation of school buses has been found dangerous in some sections where roads are not too good at best.

This is true on Scholfield Creek, where the bus has not been operated recently. A teacher and some of the pupils living in that section have taken up temporary residence in Reedsport until the bus can again operate. Parents of some of the other pupils have been bringing them to town in private cars.

On the Smith River road, the North Fork hill has rutted out so badly since it froze and thawed that it is difficult to operate the bus beyond the North Fork bridge. Road patrolman Clyde Rydell is hauling in crushed rock to this bad place in an effort to keep it open for travel.

Graveled streets in Reedsport are getting in "terrible condition" in some places for the same reason, freezing and then thawing having softened the surfaces to a point where all traffic does damage.

Owners of livestock are finding it necessary to feed much heavier than customary at this time of year, and a shortage of hay may result unless weather conditions moderate soon and pasture conditions improve.

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Water Projects Announced For Lower Umpqua

The list of river and harbor projects and flood control projects on the lower Umpqua River and tributaries has been furnished by Col. O. E. Walsh, district engineer at Portland. The list includes recently completed projects, those planned for the near future and those now being worked on.

The river and harbor projects are:

1. Umpqua Bar, Jetty and Channel—Maintenance dredging operations will be resumed in the entrance and on the inside channel to Reedsport when weather conditions permit.
2. Gardiner Channel—This new work project will be completed as soon as a suitable dredge is available, which it is anticipated, will be during the coming season.
3. Winchester Bar—The River and Harbor Act approved June 30, 1948, authorized a project including a channel 12 feet deep, 100 feet wide from deep water in the river to the vicinity of the dock in Winchester Bar with a mooring and turning basin 12 feet deep, 175 feet wide and 300 feet long.

Disposal area to be furnished by local interests. Funds for construction have not yet been appropriated by Congress. 4. Smith River—The River and Harbor Act of June 30, 1948, also authorized a project in Smith River, to provide a channel six feet deep at mean lower low water, and 100 feet wide from the mouth of the river to the mouth of North Fork, and thence four feet deep at mean lower low water and 75 feet wide to Sulphur Spring Landing, with a passing place 125 feet wide and 600 feet long in the vicinity of the mouth of North Fork, with disposal areas to be furnished by local interests. No funds for the construction of this project have yet been appropriated by Congress.

5. Scholfield River—The district engineer's report was submitted to the Division Engineer, North Pacific Division, May 20, 1948, in response to a resolution of the Committee on Public Works of the United States Senate, adopted March 4, 1947, with a view to determining whether it is advisable to modify the existing project in the lower Umpqua River, with particular reference to providing improvements at and in the vicinity of the confluence of the Scholfield River and the Umpqua River. It is anticipated that a public notice on the findings of the report will be issued soon by the division engineer.

Leed's Island levee projects have been completed. 2. Providence Creek closure is about ninety percent completed and will be finished as soon as weather permits. 3. Loon Lake outlet channel clearing has been completed. 4. Plans and specifications are being prepared for rehabilitation of portions of lower Smith River levees. It is anticipated that this construction will be performed this coming summer.

Funds for the purpose of refunding money advanced for the dredging of the Gardner stub channel were included in the recommendations of the District Engineer's Office, but it is understood these funds have been eliminated from the budgetary items submitted to Congress for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1949. These funds were advanced by the Port of Umpqua Commission on a loan basis.
