WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Now that she doesn't have to go on any campaign trips, Margaret Truman is taking up her singing career again.

The White House announced that the President's daughter has signed with James V. Davidson of New York as her manager in "concert and allied fields for the 1949-50 season."

Margaret had an active musical career, including a cross-country concert tour, in 1947. The critics were not overly enthusiastic, but the crowds liked her—as they did on her journeys with the President in 1948's political campaign.

Margaret, now 24, keeps in good condition. She doesn't even smoke and keeps reasonable hours.

Catholic Teachers End Strike for Wage Boost. MONTREAL, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Striking Roman Catholic lay teachers, who walked out a week ago for higher wages, voted yesterday to return to their jobs yesterday.

A spokesman for the 2,000 teachers said they "surrendered unconditionally." Earlier, Eugene Simard, chairman of the Catholic School Commission, refused to guarantee the teachers immunity from reprisals.

About 50,000 pupils were affected by the strike. The teachers had asked an increase of \$300 to \$700 a year in basic pay, which is now \$1,000 a year.
