

OSC Vet Parents Happy But Advise Caution to Youth

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Veteran married students on this campus, with children, are in general well satisfied with their combined student-family arrangement, but if they were advising engaged couples of normal college age they would recommend waiting until after graduation for marriage.

Such is the predominant opinion found by Mrs. Florence Allen in a questionnaire study of 36 student veteran families, each of whom had one or more children. She used this study as the basis of a thesis on "Family Problems of a Limited Group of College Student Veterans Who Are Parents," as part of her work for a master's degree in home economics.

Mrs. Allen, herself a mother and the wife of a veteran who is completing work here for a doctor's degree in botany, is now an instructor here in household administration.

Asked what would be their recommendation to engaged couples of normal college age, in contrast with the older returned veterans, 58 percent of the men

and 51 percent of the women said they would recommend finishing college before marriage. Almost exactly a third of both men and women said they would recommend marriage, with postponement of children until after graduation. They said this would only apply if the wife were reconciled to dropping out of college if the "no children" plan failed.

Only two of the men and four of the women went all the way and recommended marriage, with children, while in college.

Family finances, child care difficulties and housing were mentioned most often, in that order, as the chief problems of married students with children. All but two families said they had to supplement GI bill income either by working or by drawing on savings or both.

Morse Opposes Haste in Repeal Of T-H Statute

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24 — (AP)—Democrats on the Senate Labor Committee met secretly yesterday and were reported to have agreed among themselves to cut hearings short and speed action on a Taft-Hartley Act repealer.

Senator Bill (D-Aia) told reporters he expects a February 10 deadline will be fixed to end hearings on the bill.

The Democrats met in advance of a full committee meeting. Administration supporters were reported to have pressed for early action in the face of a Republican-backed schedule which would delay Senate consideration of the repealer until April.

While word of the Democratic meeting was circulating at the Capitol, Senator Morse (R-Ore) told the senate that he will oppose "any steamroller tactics on the part of labor" to hasten repeal of the Taft-Hartley law.

Morse said that he, for one, is not going to "be rushed into any quick action."

Morse's speech came on the heels of fresh prodding from the CIO for Congress to act swiftly.

Arthur J. Goldberg, CIO general counsel, told a news conference in the hour before the senate met that there is no need for congress to hold any hearing on repeal of the Taft-Hartley law.

"There never was a statute so thoroughly debated in a campaign," Goldberg said he spoke for CIO President Philip Murray who is ill in a Pittsburgh hospital.

He told the reporters that his private conversations with lawmakers indicated enough votes to repeal the Taft-Hartley Act and restore the Wagner Act of 1935 in one step—then proceed to amend the Wagner act.

This is the so-called "two-pack" treatment which labor favors.

CLEVELAND, Jan. 25 — (AP)—Lou Boudreau signed his name on a Cleveland Indian contract today that placed him among the highest paid performers in baseball.

The shortstop—manager of the world champion Indians signed a new two-year contract on a straight pay basis—with no attendance bonuses involved.

In terms of cash, it is hard to determine what that will mean but President Bill Veech of the Indians termed it one of the highest salaries in the history of the game. That would put it up around Bob Feller's reputed \$82,000 and the \$80,000 Babe Ruth earned one season with the Yankees.

Boudreau has been working under an old contract with one year to run and it estimated he earned above \$50,000 last season.

Canyonville Straw Vote Favors Bonds For Sewer System

Ways and means of financing the construction of a sanitary sewer system and disposal plant is being considered by the City of Canyonville. A straw vote of citizens, taken at a recent meeting called by Mayor Al Mault to advise the public of the problems involved, was overwhelmingly in favor of a bond issue election as early as possible so the system can be built as a whole instead of in small sections with temporary disposal.

James R. Daugherty, civil-sanitary engineer, 214 U. S. Bank Bldg., Roseburg, made the topographic survey and preliminary design of the complete sewerage system and disposal plant, estimated to cost \$90,000. The system is completely gravity flow to a proposed disposal plant site near Canyon Creek at the north end of town. The plant provides Imhoff tank primary treatment followed by filtration and final chlorination of effluent, to comply with State Department of Health requirements. Canyonville with a population of 183 now is growing rapidly and the plant will be designed to provide additional units as required.

The sewerage system as designed will require 10,000 lin. ft. of 6-in. pipe, 16,500 lin. ft. of 8-in. pipe, 1,120 lin. ft. of 10-in. pipe and 2,400 lin. ft. of 12-in. outfall main. There will be 80 manholes and 660 lin. ft. of 8-in. inverted siphon creek crossings to serve districts east of Canyonville Creek and to extend the outfall main to the disposal plant site. Canyonville has a municipally owned water system supplied by gravity from a heavily forested area on the headwaters of Pet Creek. The sale of timber on the portion below the dam is being considered as a means of financing the sewer system. A sewer connection charge has already been established and a sewer charge based on water usage is being investigated as another source of revenue which may eliminate the need for issuing bonds.

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State, Federal Tax Aides Dated In Douglas Towns

A state income tax auditor will be in Roseburg at the Courthouse during the week Feb. 14 to 18, inclusive, from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m., daily except Saturday, when the hours will be 8 a. m. to 12 noon, an announcement from the State Tax Commission states.

Under Oregon State Income Tax law, returns must be filed by single individuals (or married and not living with husband or wife) having a net income from all sources of \$750 or more during the taxable year, and married couples having a combined net income from all sources of \$1500 or more during the taxable year.

All returns for the calendar year 1948 must be filed on or before April 15, 1949. No charge will be made for the service of the auditor on his itinerant visits. Returns may be mailed to the State Tax Commission, Salem.

In addition to the Roseburg dates, an auditor will be on duty at Myrtle Creek in the City Hall from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. Feb. 16; at the Canyonville Community Hall Feb. 17 at the same hours, and at Reedsport City Hall Feb. 25 from 9 a. m. to 3 p. m. The schedule also calls for visits to North Bend, Coos Bay, Coquille, Myrtle Point, Bandon and Gold Beach in the Southwestern Oregon area.

Petition Asks That Will Be Admitted to Probate

Petition has been filed in Douglas County Probate Court, by John A. Osborn, asking that the will of Reginald E. Campbell, who died July 9, 1948, in Los Angeles, Calif., be admitted to probate.

The petitioner says that Campbell, in addition to an estate in Los Angeles County, left an estate in Douglas County consisting of real property of a probable value of \$60,000, with an annual income of \$3,000, and personal property of a probable value of \$12,000.

The last will and testament, dated Sept. 27, 1945, was filed July 28, 1948 in the office of the Los Angeles County Clerk, and a certified copy of the will was submitted with the petition. Listed as heirs are the son and daughter, Robert E. Campbell, Newport Beach, Calif., and Norma Campbell Craig, Long Beach, Calif.

The petitioner requests that he be appointed administrator, and that George W. Dimmick, R. H. Wilson and J. Ross Hutchinson be named appraisers.



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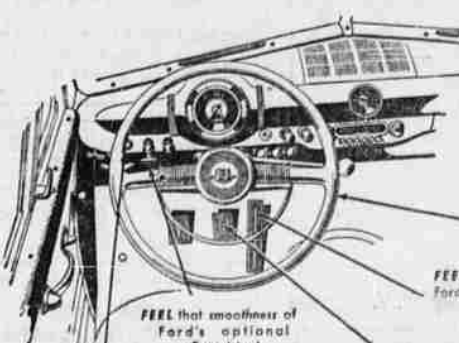
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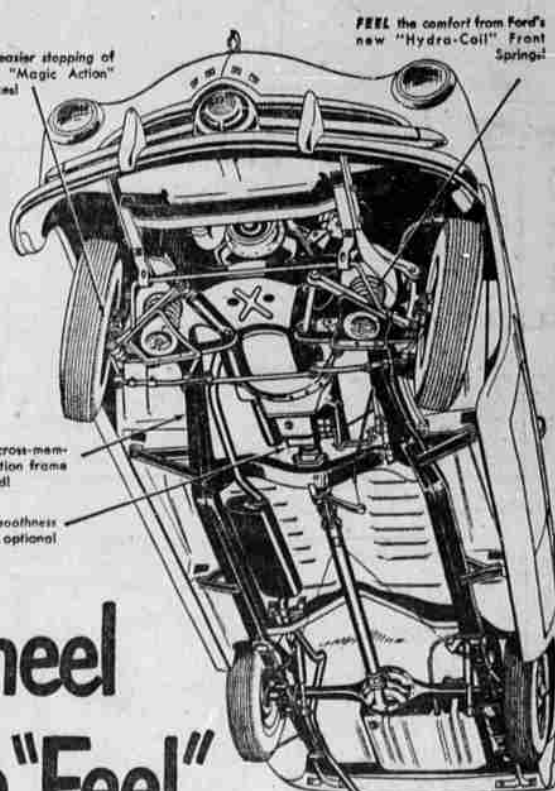
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
