Oregon Stream Pollution's Ending Requires \$30 Million

PORTLAND, Jan. 26. (AP)—If stream pollution is to be ended in Oregon, 108 communities will need to spend some \$30,000,000 for new or improved sewage disposal plants.

That is the conclusion of Curtis M. Everts Jr., state sanitary engineer in his report released through the State Board of Health.

Despite this need, considerable progress has been made, he said. Since the 1939 establishment of the state sanitary authority, 52 public sewage treatment plants serving more than 128,000 persons have been constructed. Twelve of them were completed in the past two years. Final plans for 12 more have been completed and plans for an additional 44 are in preparation.

Last year work was under way on 16 sewage treatment plants costing an aggregate of \$1,011,585, he said.

The major industrial waste disposal problem in the state, he said, comes from Willamette Valley pulp and paper mills and canneries. The mills are making monthly reports to the authority. Everts said, and "will be expected to do their share in abating the pollution of our public waterways."

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 26. (AP)—There are more "actual and potential" enemies in Washington, D. C., than could enter the United States through Alaska, says the Rev. Father Bernard R. Hubbard, the famed "Glacier Priest." "We're terribly and woefully weak in Washington," Father Hubbard said here yesterday. "There's too much Liberalism there in a disguise for Leftism." "Alaska is in the middle, all right," he said. "It is our nearest approach to both the Soviet Republics and the countries behind the Iron curtain. But I look on Alaska as utterly an offensive base. It should be built up. There is a need for more housing and equipment."
