South Counters With Plan To Send Negroes North

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—(AP)—The South came up yesterday with this double-barreled answer to civil rights proposals:

(1)—Let millions of Negroes move north at government expense and (2)—shift white people to the South to take their place, also at government expense.

The multi-billion dollar program was proposed in a bill by Senator Russell (D-Ga.).

He said the South firmly believes in its present social order of segregated races. If the rest of the nation wants a chance, he said, the racial problem ought to be equalized.

The program provides for moving as many as 1,500,000 Negro families to Northern States. It would be on purely a voluntary basis; they could go if they wanted to.

Berlin Airlift Cost to U. S. Nears \$107 Million

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Seven months of the Berlin airlift has cost the Air Force and Navy \$106,750,000, the services reported yesterday.

This figure does not include the cost of supplies flown into the blockaded city, nor those of the Army which provides ground transportation, cargo handling and other services supporting "Operation Vittles."
