Attack Against One Nation In North Atlantic Pact Will Be Viewed as Attack Against All

NEW YORK, Jan. 29 — (AP)—The New York Times said yesterday that officials negotiating the North Atlantic security pact have accepted the principle that an armed attack against one signatory nation shall be considered an attack against all of them.
