Stalin-Truman Meeting Expected by Russians

does not specify where, or even at a mutually suitable place. The Russian leader also said the Soviet government would be willing to discuss a joint declaration of peaceful intentions and gradual disarmament.

(Stalin has said previously that he would be willing to meet with Mr. Truman. The President, in turn, has offered to meet with Stalin any time the Soviet leader will come to Washington. Officials in Washington pointed out, however, that there has been no official approach for such a meeting.)

Conditions Laid Down In answer to a series of questions, Stalin also said Russia "sees no obstacles" to lifting the Berlin blockade if the Western Powers meet two conditions.

One would be postponement of the establishment of a Western German state pending a meeting of the Big Four council of foreign ministers on the entire German issue. The other would be lifting of the Allied counter-blockade.

Klamath County Livestock in Good Winter Shape

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 31.—Livestock in this section is in fair shape despite the cold winter, and there may be sufficient hay to carry through the season, reports from the ranch country indicated today.

Export of Klamath hay to other regions where there are extreme shortages won't amount to much in volume due to the need for the feed here.

Winter feeding of cattle in the Klamath country has been substantially reduced in modern times by operation methods of most cattle ranchers. They pasture great herds of cattle in this area in spring and summer, then ship them to winter feeding grounds in the Sacramento Valley for the winter.

Some cattle from the Bly district have been moved into Lake County where more feed is available.

Larger ranchers in the Chiloquin area will probably have some surplus hay to sell but their neighbors are expected to take most of it. Potatoes have been fed to cattle in heavy volume this year.

Cattlemen along Williamson River north of here have been having trouble losing livestock through the ice. Three or four ranchers have lost about six head the past few days. Water holes are chopped in the ice and guards placed on duty to herd the cows off the ice but even so, some animals wander out on the ice and break through into the swift stream.

Oregon Ranks Second in Nation as Hop Producer

CORVALLIS, Ore.—(AP)—Oregon was the nation's second largest hop producer last year, with a crop of 15,750,000 pounds, the Federal Extension Service reported.

That was about 2 percent below the 1947 crop. Washington's production of 22,700,000 pounds was the largest in the nation, and 12 percent bigger than that state's 1947 crop.

Prices on 1948 Oregon hops still held by growers have fallen to 25 or 30 cents a pound for regular seeded clusters. A few contracts for this year's crop have been signed at 50 cents a pound.

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Oregon State Ties Cougars for Lead in North Division

SEATTLE, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Batling Oregon State was locked with Washington State College at the top of the Northern Division basketball heap today.

The Beavers slugged their way into the throne room with a pair of weekend victories over the University of Washington while the Cougars took a surprise pasting from last-place Idaho. Both pace-setting clubs have five wins and a loss.

This weekend, OSC plays two against Idaho, but the critical series is set for Feb. 7-8, when the Beavers and Cougars tangle at Pullman.

Last weekend's tussle eliminated Washington from the race in every sense but the mathematical. The Huskies' hopes of survival rest on a two-game set against Oregon this weekend at Eugene.

Oregon State popped Washington 54-44 on Friday night and 49-45 on Saturday night. A second-half resurgence enabled the Beavers to grab the Saturday tussle.

The Cougars' unlooked-for Saturday night loss to Idaho was the second in 20 games and their first in six league starts. The score was 41-32.

Oregon, meanwhile, flew the conference coop and got clipped twice by touring Long Island University. The Blackbirds hung a 68-66 defeat on the Ducks Friday night and nosed out the home club 55-53 in a Saturday night thriller.
