Protection of Bee Plant Objective Of Conference

Protection of the bee industry of the northwest, and through that protection of much of the agricultural industry itself, is the objective of a conference in Seattle this summer being arranged by a committee of the O.S.C. experiment station.

The conference has been called by the National Federation of Beekeepers associations which has held similar meetings in recent years in Iowa, Massachusetts, and Nebraska. The Northwest meeting will be July 12.

Invited to attend the conference are federal, state and county weed control men; federal, state and local railroad agricultural and soil conservation officials; extension representatives, highway officials, fruit and seed producers as well as beekeepers themselves and the general public.

Widespread destruction of pollen and nectar producing plants through use of 2,4-D, and improper use of new and powerful chemical insecticides have become a threat to the bee industry, it is pointed out. As bees are vital to the production of the very crops on which weedicides and insecticides are used, better coordination is sought.

Tragic Living Conditions In Russian Zone of Berlin Told in Letter Received

Tragic conditions in the Russian zone of Germany are described in a letter received by Julius Maser of Riddle, from a niece he has not seen in many years. The letter was smuggled out secretly. The niece and her family, Maser says, originally were in Poland, but were dispossessed of their belongings and property and were forced into Germany by the Russians.

Maser, himself, was born in Russia, where he later became a landowner and served three years in the czar's army. Twenty-five years ago he emigrated to Canada, later moved into Washington State. For the last 15 years he has lived at Riddle on a small farm.

The letter, in translation, follows:

"I will this day, hastily write a few lines to you. That we have been deprived of everything, you no doubt have been informed. Now, there are no more packages from abroad allowed to enter the Russian zone.

"When grownups or adults are detected crossing the line, they are imprisoned and must endure their punishment. The women are abused and forced and their clothing is taken away, especially if the dress and shoes can be used. Then with a heavy cudgel they receive their punishment. Many are whipped until they appear nearly dead when they are told to leave.

"Recently they detected a man in the act of crossing the line with the butt end or stick of the gun they killed him. Such things cause no thought at all among the Russians. They can do as they please with the Germans in their zone, they enter the homes, take anything they want, force the women and girls who have reached the age of 12 years and over for their own desires.

"If the husband or parents re-

sist and try to protect their own they are immediately shot.

"If a person on the street is seen with a good suit or shoes, he is stopped and stripped down to his shirt and told to move on.

"Whoever owns 400 acres of land is evicted at once and all is taken from him, just like it happened to us. When we were driven out of Poland, all that they allowed us to take was just what we had on our bodies at the time. When the land is taken, it is turned over to the S. E. D. party. Whoever belongs to this party gets the privilege to buy clothes and shoes, but for the others there is nothing to be had.

"At present our state of livelihood is very grave. The Russians come and take almost everything from us, then transport it to their sector in the city of Berlin so that the people there are kept from starving.

"With the little that we have to purchase with, they will not allow us the things that are listed on our relief cards which they furnish us. Now, it must soon reach the climax, either we must receive help or we shall perish in our present condition.

"People all around us are committing suicide because of their discouragement, nothing to eat, nothing to wear, and most people are without wood or coal. The little we have to eat, most of it is eaten raw.

"Up to this time we have had a meagre supply of wood, so that we have not been freezing. We received a letter from my brother. He writes that he is building a house and purchased a horse and next year he hopes to obtain two cows. They have rented to him 30 acres of land and 10 acres of woodland. All this was taken from large landowners. Without a doubt my brother has joined the S. E. D. party.

CHILD BEATER JAILED
PORTLAND, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Frank White Eagle, 45, Gresham, will serve six months in jail for beating his 5-year-old daughter and burning her fingers with matches. He was convicted of assault and battery. Testimony was that he was punishing her for stuffing newspapers into a stove.

Uranium Ore Flow From Utah Plants Prediction Made

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Uranium—basic ingredient of the atom bomb—is scheduled to flow from five plants in Utah and Colorado by the end of this year.

This was disclosed by Philip C. Leahy, manager of the Atomic Energy Commission's branch at Grand Junction, Colo. Speaking Friday at the annual meeting of the Mining Association of the Southwest, Leahy said:

"Contracts for the purchase of uranium production from the two private plants now operating in the Colorado plateau region have been extended.

"Negotiations are about completed for contracts covering the operations of a plant at Durango, Colo., and another at Uravan, Colo. The mill the AEC owns at Monticello, Utah, is being readied. All five will be operating to capacity this year."

Leahy said the commission, in addition has engaged the U. S. Geological Survey to drill several hundred thousand feet in the Colorado-Utah area. The AEC now pays approximately \$3.50 per pound for average grade uranium ore, the engineer said.

However, he said he knew of no instance in which anyone has yet won the \$10,000 bonus offered for the discovery of a new uranium deposit.

Reedsport Port Dock Repairs Being Finished

Repairs to the port dock in Reedsport are being completed by a crew of men working for Contractor Tom Lillebo. This is part of a job started a few months ago, but this particular work could not be done while the lumber schooner Barbara Olson was moored to the dock during the longshore strike, and there was no crew aboard the ship to move her.

When the Olson left this week for Coos Bay to complete loading, the pile driver was moved into place and work started to complete the project.
