Soil Conservation Meet at Hood River Beckons Farmers

Farmer committeemen who administer the various programs of the Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration will assemble at the Columbia Gorge Hotel at Hood River for a three-day conference—Feb. 3, 4 and 5. All counties of the state will be represented.

Ted Dunwoodie, secretary-manager of the Douglas County Agricultural Conservation Association, said the program will include competent help from top Department of Agriculture officials from Washington, D. C. B. F. Vance of Texas will represent the administrator of the Production and Marketing Administration. Others who will be there are W. B. Crawley, assistant administrator for production; J. I. Thompson, assistant administrator for marketing; and Glenn R. Harris and L. C. Fry, directors of the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Soil conservation will be the theme of the conference according to Dunwoodie. However, other topics, such as price support programs, production goals and crop insurance, will also be discussed.

Soil conservation has been made the main theme of this meeting because as Dunwoodie states, the state committee believes it is "about time to take inventory or make an appraisal of where we are in our conservation and to outline the job that lies ahead of us."

TO COUNT ANTELOPE

BOISE, Feb. 1.—(AP)—A four-state antelope census will be planned tomorrow as game department representatives meet at Lakeview, Ore.

The Idaho Fish and Game department, which is sending four men to the meeting, reported that a simultaneous count is needed in Idaho, Nevada, California and Oregon to get accurate figures because large herds migrate between the states. Representatives of the four states are to attend.

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AFL Support Sought For Public Works Program

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 1.—(AP)—Federal Works Administrator Philip B. Fleming yesterday asked American Federation of Labor support for advance planning of a multi-billion dollar public works building program for use in event of a dip in employment.

Fleming asked members of the AFL Executive Council, here for a midwinter meeting, to support legislation to provide approximately \$100,000,000 planning funds to get the projects ready on paper.

Fleming said plans should be acquired and detail plans made for various city, county and state public works projects, including schools, as well as federal projects.

AFL leaders steered clear of any direct comment on the Truman administration's new labor law proposals in Washington for the present but privately planned a number of features of the plan.

Freeze Halts Atlanta's Power for Three Hours

ATLANTA, Feb. 1.—(AP)—A freezing rain, which coated trees and flowers, turned lawns into fairylands yesterday but also left Atlanta without electricity for nearly three hours.

Hugh W. Lester, 61, climbed 15 floors in a downtown office building when elevators stalled, then suffered a heart attack and dropped dead.

Commuters turned hitch-hikers as power buses were stranded and early shoppers found stores locked.

A lot of children didn't mind the storm—many schools closed. Japonica bushes, tulip trees and jonquils, which bloomed unseasonably early last week, were coated with ice.

'Gene' Powell Given Post In Photographers Assn.

PORTLAND, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Henry Dwight Fehly, Eugene commercial photographer, was elected president of the Photographers Association of Oregon yesterday.

Some 150 members, attending the second annual convention here, named Eugene Powell, Roseburg, and Robert Ball, Corvallis, to the executive board. Methods of regulating business practices were discussed by the main speaker, Rupert Bullivant.

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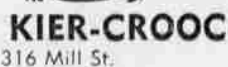

Hoover Urges Reorganization Power for Truman

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Herbert Hoover urged yesterday that Congress give the president power to reorganize the government to the point that fewer than 20 major agencies report directly to the White House.

There now are 1500 bureaus, commissions, divisions, departments, administrations and offices in the federal government. Hoover said opinions vary as to whether the number reporting directly to the president is 65, 94 or 101.

The former president's recommendations—none yet in specific detail—were contained in a statement prepared for the House Committee on Executive Expenditures. This committee is conducting hearings on an administration bill granting permanent sweeping reorganizing powers to the chief executive.

Hoover urged that the powers be vested in the president, because "it is hopeless to expect congress to investigate and legislate out the vast detail" of duplications and conflicts in federal agencies.
