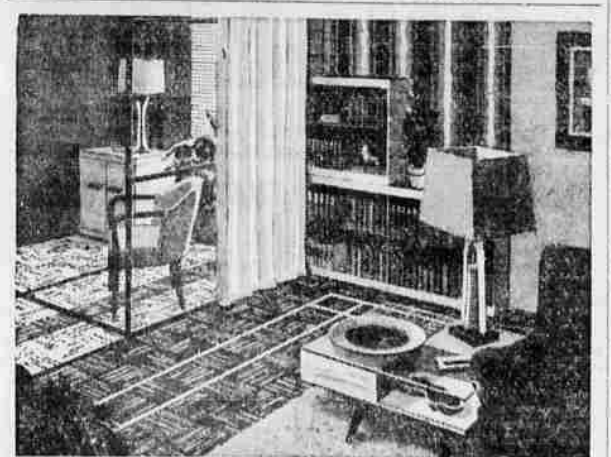
Cottage Grove, Indian Boxers To Battle Tonight

Woman Uses Five Children In Panhandling Racket

MACOMB, Ill., Feb. 2. (AP)—Mrs. Joan Brooks, 22, charged with kidnapping a seven-year-old Dubuque, Iowa, boy, related yesterday, State Attorney Roger W. Hayes said, that she had "taken" four other children in the last five years.

The children, Hayes said, were used by Mrs. Brooks as "decoys to enhance collections she solicited for mission houses." The four other children ranged in age from six weeks to three years.

Proposed Shift of Mediation Service to Labor Department Strongly Opposed by Ching

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2. (AP)—Cyrus S. Ching, head of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, told Congress yesterday it would be a "step backwards" if his now independent agency is put under the Labor Department. He said the service's reputation for impartiality would suffer.

Ching testified before the Senate labor committee in opposition to a section of the administration's new labor bill which would shift the service to the Labor Department.

"It is with real regret that I find that candor and devotion to the public interest require that I say to you that such action will seriously damage the effectiveness of government mediation," Ching said.

"It is with a step backwards in the terribly important job of strengthening our industrial democracy by promoting sound practices and usages of collective bargaining and minimizing and preventing labor disputes."

Ching's words meant open controversy between two of the administration's top labor men over the point. Secretary of Labor Tobin has asked that the service be put under his department.

Tobin also said that the bill, as presented to the committee, had approval of President Truman. That implied that Mr. Truman backed placing the conciliation service under Tobin.

The Taft-Hartley law, which the administration is out to repeal, established the independent status of the Conciliation Service.

Some Congress members have predicted that the administration, despite the big Democratic majorities in Senate and House, will have difficulty winning approval for ending its independent status.

Senator Smith (R-N.J.) predicted flatly that Congress will not agree to another administration proposal to do away with the Taft-Hartley law's provision for court orders to block national emergency strikes.

Ching, 71, a former industrial relations director for the U. S. Rubber Company, told the senators he felt his mediators would not receive the same confidence from employers and unions if they were working for the Labor Department.

Airplane Spin Experts to Clash On Mat Program

The long-awaited "Battle of the Airplane Spins" will come to the Roseburg Armory Saturday night when Frankie Stojack, Tacoma, and Billy Weidner, Boston, clash in the headline attraction of Matchmaker Don Owen's weekly wrestling show.

Douglas County grappling followers have been debating the prowess of the two matmen, some claiming that the "Boston Strong Boy" possesses a more potent spin than that employed by the Pacific coast junior heavyweight champion. The answer will be given Saturday night—and before an inevitable capacity crowd.

An outstanding three-fall preliminary has also been billed, sending Tony Ross, the "Salem Terror," against Al Alexander, a newcomer from New York.

Although Weidner was unable to clamp his spin on Jack Lipscomb successfully last week, the villain always heading for the ropes, Billy beat the Indiana mat "meanie" with a full-nelson that put his foe out of commission.

Weidner, the German from Boston, requested a title match, but Stojack refused, pointing out that he has been generous with his title defenses and that this would be one too many.

Ex-Oregon Legislator Hurt in Crash of Autos

THE DALLES, Feb. 2. (AP)—Arthur W. Lindberg, 56, former state legislator from Pendleton, was injured in a highway accident near here Monday.

He suffered a broken leg and cuts about the face when his car and another driven by Henry A. Wetherell, Arlington, collided near Big Eddy, about five miles east of here on the Old Oregon Trail Highway.

Ben Wetherell, a passenger in his brother's car, suffered cuts and a possible concussion. With Lindberg, he was in The Dalles Hospital today.

Henry Wetherell and his wife, Dorene, suffered cuts and bruises, but were not hospitalized.

Lindberg, a prominent Umatilla County rancher served in the 1945 legislature on appointment by the Umatilla County Court to succeed Carl Engdahl, who stepped up to the Senate.
