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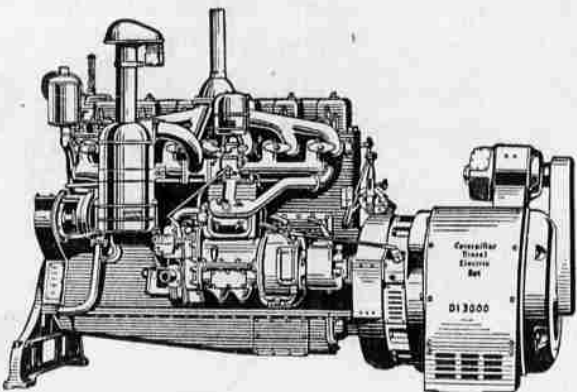
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LOCAL NEWS

Problem of Suburban Sanitation, Drunken Drivers, Impracticality Of New Autos Toastmasters' Topics

His hope that "civic pride can be stirred up enough" in Roseburg's suburban area that the sanitation problem can be solved was voiced by John Dentler, one of four speakers on a Roseburg Toastmasters' Club program on Tuesday night.

Mrs. Woodruff Better—Mrs. V. S. Woodruff is able to be out again, following an illness at her home in Elgarose.

Dentler recalled his period of service in the Navy during the recent war, when his ship was called on to proceed to an island in the Pacific which had been swept by a typhoon. The island was thickly populated. Far out at sea he could detect the odor resulting from lack of proper sanitation.

He said a similar situation faces sections of Roseburg today, where apparently the problem has been "thrown out the window and those people don't seem to care," he added that, "We've got to get those people out of their lethargy. I wish we could stir up civic pride enough to see if we can't get some improvement."

Other Speakers Heard
Other speakers on the program included Phil Harth, who advocated stiffer penalties for drunken drivers in a speech entitled, "The Damn Fool Behind the Wheel," and Don Gum, who spoke of the tradition of knighthood, as applied to the movements of the knights on a chess board.

Allen E. Clute, toastmaster of the evening, called on two persons for impromptu speeches. They were Jim Turk, who asserted that he would "lead a revolution against the modern automobile as one of the most flimsy inventions of mankind," and John Patton, who told of some of the beneficial effects of freezing weather on agriculture.

Modern Auto Rapped
Turk declared that the modern automobile is "most inefficient;" that the massive chromium-plated front bumpers and grills look like juke boxes, serving "no practical purposes." The hood is "too long, too wide, and too flimsy." He asserted that drivers cannot see the fender, and he "defied anyone" to drive at 30 miles an hour between posts set eight feet apart.

He said he thought the modern cars are poorly designed and hard to get into. Traffic signals

Prizes Posted by Elks Lodge For Best High School Student Essays on Democracy Theme

Roseburg Elks Lodge, No. 326 will pay \$150 in prizes to three high school students submitting the best entries in the nationwide essay contest sponsored by the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks.

Students in all Douglas County high schools, except the high school at Reedsport, will be eligible to compete. The Reedsport area is in the jurisdiction of the Coos Bay Elks lodge, to which essays from that locality will be submitted.

Roseburg lodge will pay a first prize of \$75, second prize of \$50 and third prize of \$25, in maturity value U. S. Government Savings Bonds for the best essay on the subject "Why Democracy Works."

Local winners will be eligible to state-wide competition, and the best essays from Oregon will be entered in the national contest. George I. Hall of Lynbrook, N. Y., grand exalted ruler, informs Harry Pinniger, exalted ruler of Roseburg lodge, that national prizes will total \$2,000: first prize, \$1,000; second prize, \$500; third prize, \$250; and five prizes of \$50 each. All prizes will be in the form of Savings Bonds.

Students from the ninth to twelfth grades, inclusive, of public, parochial or private schools are eligible to compete. Essays must be not less than 300 words nor more than 750 words in length; written in contestant's own handwriting, and must be his or her own original work. Essays must be submitted to the secretary of the Elks Lodge on or before March 1.
