Compromise in Rogue River Basin Controversy Foreseen From Conflicting Reports

BOISE, Feb. 3 — (AP) — Rogue River Basin studies, aimed at adjusting conflicts of interests, were ordered yesterday as a step toward comprehensive development of the basin.

R. J. Newell, regional director of the Bureau of Reclamation, said two reports on the problem have been completed, with one calling for adoption of the bureau's "plan A" despite recreational interests' opposition, and the other calling for new studies and adjustments.

The first report was made by Dr. Harlan H. Barrows of the University of Chicago who as consultant for the Department of the Interior held hearings at Medford last June.

His report concluded that few persons were interested in "plan B" and he recommended it be discarded. The other plan, "A," should be adopted subject to final revisions.

Plan "A" calls for nine storage reservoirs in the Rogue Basin, two of them on the main stem of the Rogue and seven on tributaries.

The other report, by the Pacific Northwest Field Committee, composed of regional representatives of all Department of the Interior agencies, concludes that there is no fully satisfactory solution of the Rogue River problem without compromise and adjustment.

It said the Rogue can neither be viewed wholly from the point of view of recreation and sports fishing or from that of agriculture and industry.

Specifically, the field committee recommended:

1. Studies to determine recreational and wilderness values and the extent to which these would be affected by proposed developments.
2. Studies leading to modification of "plan A."
3. More comprehensive study of the basin and its potentialities leading to early completion of a plan of co-ordinated development.

Newell said that the Bureau of Reclamation will proceed immediately with preparation of an interim Rogue River Basin report, to be based on the best

Portland Council Votes Fund for Housing Survey

PORTLAND, Feb. 3 — (AP) — The City Council voted, 4 to 1, yesterday to appropriate up to \$15,000 for a survey of low cost housing needs in this area.

The city would use the money to match funds raised by public subscription. Washington, Clackamas, and Multnomah counties will be asked to cooperate in the survey.

The council also voted to issue no more building permits in the Bertha area until a new sewer system is built. Bertha voted last November to become annexed to Portland.

Commissioner Fred L. Peterson proposed employing a consultant to study Portland Traction Company operations and decide whether street car fares should be raised to 13 cents.

London Bridge Falling Down—Only by Inches

LONDON, Feb. 3 — (AP) — It's true London Bridge is falling down.

London Bridge, now almost 120 years old, has dropped several inches at one point on its south side, river officials reported today.

But city officials aren't worried that it will tumble into the River Thames.

It may be falling a bit, they said, but it's under constant observation, no new cracks have appeared in it, and on the whole it's "perfectly sound."
