Indians Lose To Reedsport Quintet, 43-40

Hubbard Scores Half Of R. H. S. Points, But Rest Of Team Doesn't Click

After taking an initial lead and heading the Reedsport quintet 8-7 at the end of the first quarter, the Roseburg Indians dropped back and were defeated, 43-40, at Reedsport Saturday night.

The Indians scored three points before Reedsport tallied its first basket. Roseburg was getting past the Braves' zone defense, but the opponents were successful in keeping ahead by connecting with the long ones, against the Indians' own zone play.

With 30 seconds to go, the Braves had the Indians down 10 points but in the last eight seconds the Indians made five points as time ran out.

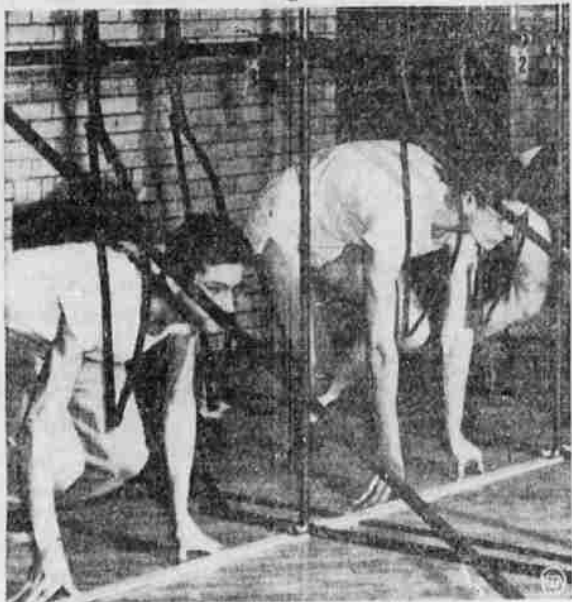
The game was close, and herring the last 30 seconds, the score was never more than four points apart. Roseburg's final second rally burst with the gun. Indians fail to click.

Don Hubbard was the scoring giant for Roseburg, connecting for 20 points. However, the balance of the team was cold, hardly hitting at all.

Out of 66 field goal tries, the Indians connected with 16, half of which Hubbard made. On the free throw line, Roseburg hit 16 out of 17 times. The previous night was equally bad for the Indians in the free throw department, with only 16 field goals scored out of 62 tries.

Reedsport connected with five out of six free goal tries. At the

half, the Braves were ahead, 21-18, while at the third period gun, they topped Roseburg 29-26.

The game was rough, with Reedsport committing 25 fouls, to Roseburg's 12, but the officials did a good job in spotting infractions.

Tuesday night, Roseburg plays Sutherlin on the Senior High court. Coach Jack Newby said season tickets will not be honored as the game is Sutherlin's home game, rather than Roseburg's. Sutherlin's gymnasium is currently undergoing repairs, and they are playing home games either at Oakland or Roseburg.

Roger Wiley Still Leads North Division Scorers

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 7.—(AP)—Roger Wiley, six-foot, eight-inch Oregon center, retained his northern division individual scoring lead over the weekend when he collected 39 points in two Oregon victories over Washington. His total for ten games is 144 points, an average of 14.4 per game.

Ed Gayda of WSC, whose Cougars face Oregon State tonight and tomorrow at Pullman, has the best average with 87 points in six games for a 14.5 average.

Bill Vandenberg of Washington is runner-up to Wiley in point-making with a 107, followed by Bob Pritchett of Idaho with 98, Sammy White of Washington 85, and Paul Sowers of Oregon 83.

Gayda also has the best free-throw average with 27 out of 30.

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Cougars, O. S. C. Face Tilt Apt To Determine Title

SEATTLE, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Washington State and Oregon State Colleges tangle tonight and tomorrow night at Pullman in a series which may determine the winner of the Northern Division Pacific Coast Conference basketball title.

OCSA slumped past troublesome Idaho, 47-35, Saturday night after dropping a 51-39 decision the previous evening. The split left the Beavers in second place with a 6-2 record. The Cougars pace the circuit with five wins in six starts.

Oregon crushed Washington's last mathematical hope by trimming the Huskies, 70-49, Saturday night at Eugene. Sophomore Guard John Neely netted the winning bucket with 51 seconds left to play. The Ducks posted a 65-58 win Friday night.

The twin defeat left Washington tied with Idaho in the division cellar. Oregon moved to third place with five wins and five losses.

Oregon State stopped Idaho by throwing up a full-court defense to break up the Vandals' three-man weave out front, forcing them to hurry their tosses. They made only 13 of 53 shots.

The Beavers held 22-19 half-time edge, but came back with post-intermission surge that gave them a comfortable advantage which Idaho was never able to threaten.

Preston Brimhall held Beaver ace, Cliff Crandall to three points. Alex Peterson was high man with 14 points, though he was in the game only briefly in the second half after being knocked out in a rebound scramble at the half-time gun.

Neely was the big gun in Oregon's second-half drive against the Huskies. He tallied a total of 13 points for the night, most of them after the rest period. Washington had a 38-35 halftime margin.

Washington fought its way to the lead twice in the first half and three times in the second. Keith Jefferson, post player, led the Huskies into a 60-68 lead in the dying minutes. Then Neely tallied the crusher, a one-handed push shot from the side of the key.

Big Roger Wiley, who scored 27 points for Oregon Friday night, was held to 12 Saturday. Paul Sowers also had 13 points to share scoring honors with Neely. Ladon Henson had 17 to pace the Huskies.

Weidner Wins Over Stojack; End Freakish

Loser, with Weidner In Airplane Spin, Trips and Falls Underneath Foe

A very surprised Frankie Stojack found himself on the canvas for the three count, with Billy Weidner on top, in the third fall of the non-title main fray at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night. Stojack had gotten his second airplane spin of the match started, but tripped and Weidner landed on top of him. Weidner pinned Stojack easily and was awarded the match. In the preliminary, Tony Ross defeated Al Alexander with two out of three falls in a scheduled one-hour go.

Weidner put the show on the road when he rushed across the ring and applied a very vicious full Nelson to Stojack's neck. The unprepared coast junior heavy-weight champion gave in and Weidner was awarded the first fall after 45 seconds.

The second round became frantic with both boys bending bones and stretching muscles. Weidner demonstrated his strength by lifting Stojack off the canvas with one arm. Weidner soon exhausted his repertoire of holds and Stojack returned with his brand of crowd-pleasing fare.

Stojack made several attempts to entice his opponent into position for an airplane spin, but Weidner was cagey. However, in a weak moment Weidner forgot himself and the ex-WSC football star flipped the German onto his neck and spun him 22 times. He flipped Weidner to the mat and pinned him with a body press, after 29-25.

Weidner sought to get Stojack into an airplane spin later in the game, but "It's a poor move, that doesn't know her own child," as the old saying goes, and the champ wouldn't fall into the trap.

Then it came to pass that Stojack had his unfortunate accident while in the midst of spinning his opponent. The champ could not believe his ears when Owen stated Stojack's shoulders were on the canvas for the customary number of seconds required for a fall, but he took it like a sport when told.

In the initial grapple event, Ross took the first fall with a Boston crab in 21-01 after a crowd-pleasing session of hair pulling and other shady maneuvers. But Alexander came back in the second fall and shoulder butted his way to a fall.

The referee was an even subject for the inevitable body press. Both boys traded many holds in the third round and Ross finally got the Pollock into a punning backbreaker, with which he took the fall and the match.

Elk Slaughter Causes Dispute

YAKIMA, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Yakima Valley ranchers and sportsmen were engaged in a warm controversy today over the orchard invasion of raiding elk.

Valley sportsmen's representatives have called on prosecutor Fred Van Arsdale, district game supervisor, to attempt to stop the slaughter of the large game animals.

Unofficial estimates say that more than 150 elk have been killed by farmers.

The ranchers have indicated they intend to kill all the animals they find in their orchards. H. M. Fruit, head enforcement officer for the State Game Commission, said his investigators have been "observers" since a big drive got under way Friday, but he did not indicate that any immediate arrests would be made.

Fred Van Arsdale, district game supervisor, said farmers killed 18 elk in the Friday drive, and sportsmen expressed the fear the toll would increase.

Curb on Sale of Fireworks Again Sought in Legislature

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 7.—(AP)—The Legislature is going to consider another bill to restrict sale of fireworks. But it won't cause the fireworks that the fireworks bill caused two years ago.

The State Parent-Teacher Association and fireworks manufacturers have agreed on a bill to allow fireworks shooting for only three weeks of each year. Part of this period would be before July 4, and the rest afterward.

The bill, now being drafted, will provide for licensing of manufacturers, distributors and retailers of fireworks, and will prohibit some of the more fatal varieties of explosives.

The 1947 Legislature considered a bill to ban all fireworks, but a children's lobby defeated the bill.

To Trim Districts

A proposed constitutional amendment providing that legislative districts cannot contain more than three counties was introduced in the House by Rep. J. F. Short, Redmond, and Sen. Philip Hitchcock, Klamath Falls.

The effect of the proposal, which would have to be approved by the people, would be to trim down to three counties the two legislative districts which now contain more than three counties.

These districts are Senator Hitchcock's five county district of Crook, Deschutes, Klamath, Jefferson and Lake counties; and the representative district including Gilliam, Morrow, Sherman and Wheeler counties.

The House Social Welfare Committee has decided to introduce the bill calling for \$50 minimum old age pensions, but the committee hasn't decided if it would support it.

House Democrats introduced a memorial asking Congress to approve President Truman's proposal for a Columbia Valley Authority. It is similar to a memorial in the Senate, which will hold a public hearing on the matter February 24.

Due to regular practice, shooters have been improving their marksmanship and are turning in good scores.

Papooses Beaten By Grants Pass 8th Grade 'Five'

Coach Eddie Wyatt's eighth graders were defeated, 18-16, in a close game with Grants Pass eighth graders at Junior High School Friday afternoon.

The locals were ahead, 3-0, at the quarter and 8-4 at the half, but Grants Pass took a 15-12 lead at the three-quarter mark, which they never relinquished. The Papoose eighth graders lost the game on the free throw line, with only six tallies out of 17 tries. Grants Pass made seven out of 19 good. In the field goal department, Roseburg made five out of 25 attempts.

This is the eighth graders' fifth defeat in league play. Three games were lost by two points, while one was dropped by only one point. Medford is the only competitor to give the eighth graders a decisive 10 point loss. The Papoose eighth graders won two games in league play so far.
