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Street Renaming Procedure in Bill In Legislature

Procedure for the renaming of streets is provided in two bills introduced in the Legislature this week by Rep. Paul E. Geddes of Roseburg. The bills would amend existing legislation to permit incorporated cities to rename plated streets within a six mile radius outside the municipal limits, and the county to rename streets outside of any incorporated city or town.

The legislation was introduced as result of recent discussions in the Roseburg City Planning Commission, as to the desirability of renaming plated streets in the suburbs to conform to a uniform system of street names.

House Bill 219 provides that "it shall be the duty" of the planning commission, if there be one, or the city engineer if there is no planning commission, "to recommend the renaming of any existing street, highway, or road within a plated area if...such renaming is in the best interest of the city and the six-mile area."

The council could then rename streets as recommended, after a public hearing.

County roads and state highways would not come under jurisdiction of cities. But names of county roads and other plated streets outside of any incorporated city or town could be changed by "the governing body of the county" according to provisions of House Bill 220. Such name changes would have to be recommended by a county planning commission, if such a body exists.

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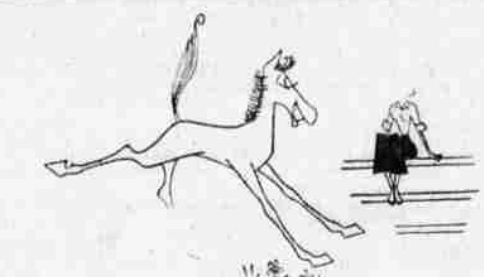
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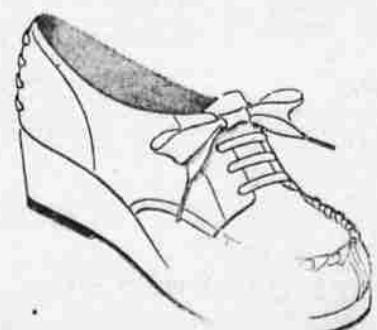
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
