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Lumber Price Drops Close 900 Northwest Sawmills

SEATTLE, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Falling prices have prompted some 900 small sawmills to shut down in Washington and Oregon. Making this report, President John M. Christensen of the Northwest Council of Lumber and Sawmill Workers (AFL) said scores of other mills had curtailed operations because of frozen log ponds and winter-clogged transport routes. He said prices began to fall three months ago and production has been cut from 20 to 23 percent. Orders are piling up, he added, as users attempt to prepare for future needs.

Death Takes Co-Founder Of Oklahoma City

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Dr. Angelo C. Scott, 91, one of the founders of Oklahoma City, died here Sunday of a heart ailment. He was described by friends as "one of the wonders of the frontier." He was chairman of the first town meeting and publisher of the first newspaper printed in Oklahoma City. He was named Oklahoma City's most useful citizen in 1937. Scott came to the state in the run that opened Indian territory April 22, 1889.

SALEM, Feb. 8.—(AP)—The legislature will be asked to approve the principle of it and provide for the investigating commission. The youth authority would supervise the State Training School for boys at Woodburn, and the state Hillcrest school for girls in Salem, as well as any private institution for children which gets aid from the state.
