Disabled Vets May Get Extra Compensation

Disabled veterans who are injured or whose existing disabilities are made worse by undergoing rehabilitation training under federal laws are eligible for extra compensation at wartime rates.

In pointing this out today, Clifford Fields, Veterans Administration representative at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital, said the provision gives added assurance to employers who may have job training openings for disabled veterans in their firms.

The injured veteran or his dependent has two years from the date of injury to file a claim for further compensation, Fields stated. If the injury is due to misconduct, the trainee is not eligible.

Possibilities for injury while in rehabilitation training are reduced at the start, however, by careful screening of all disabled veterans by VA medical and vocational specialists, Fields said. Employers also are assisted by VA training officers in setting up suitable training programs.

Further details may be obtained at the agency's office at the Veterans Hospital.

Price Breaks on Farm Futures to be Probed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—(AP)—The government ordered an investigation yesterday of recent price breaks on farm commodity futures markets.

Secretary of Agriculture Brannan instructed the Commodity Exchange Authority to obtain "full information" on trading in wheat, corn and soybean futures contracts during the price decline.

About the time his order was announced, Brannan himself was testifying before the Senate Agriculture Committee. He told the senators he sees nothing in the "basic economic situation" to warrant the price break. Some of the decline, he said, must be attributed to "speculative influences."

MEASLES INCREASE—PORTLAND, Feb. 10.—(AP)—Measles is still prevalent in Oregon, the State Board of Health reports.

Oregon had 681 cases last week, 44 percent above the previous week. The same situation prevails in other states.

The nation as a whole had a larger number of measles cases in January than during any corresponding period since 1938.

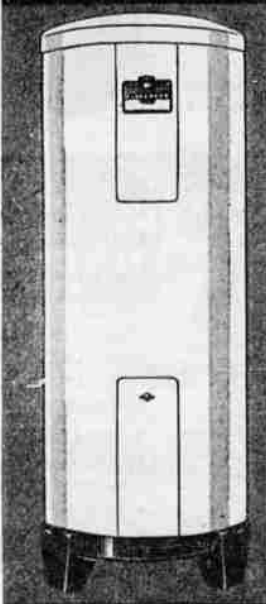

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George Owens Of Reedsport Found Dead In His Room

George Owens, about 76, was found dead in his room in the Oregon Hotel in Reedsport Tuesday. Discovery of the body resulted after water was found dripping from the ceiling of the room below his, when a wash bowl apparently ran over.

Owens, a long-time employee of the Pacific Lumber Inspection Bureau, had made his home at the Oregon Hotel for many years. At one time he was a lumber inspector at the Bbridge mill in Reedsport, but had been unable to work for the past few years because of ill health.

Owens, who followed the sea as a young man, was born in New Zealand, and has a niece residing there. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge at Port Angeles, Wash. Several months prior

to his death, Owens made arrangements to have his body buried at sea.

Mrs. Nelson, operator of the Oregon Hotel, states that Mr. Owens had suffered some sort of sick spell Tuesday morning. It is presumed that he realized his death was close, as he had spread his business papers, etc., on his bed where they would be easily found.

His wife, the former Anna Lee Aydelott, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Aydelotte of this city, has been transferred from the Eugene office of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company to the Roseburg office. She plans to join her husband as soon as he is given a permanent assignment.
