

Mrs. M. R. Bradley Dies in Portland

Mrs. Minnie R. Bradley, 80, well-known former resident of Douglas County died in Portland, Feb. 10, following a brief illness. She was born in Pennsylvania Sept. 19, 1868, and came to Oregon from Washington in 1913, making her home at Yoncalla. In 1918, she moved to Myrtle Creek and thence Roseburg, where she made her home until 1933, when she moved to Portland.

Mrs. Bradley was a life-long member of the Methodist Church, a member of the Roseburg Rebekah Lodge and of Valentine Chapter, Order of Eastern Star, at Myrtle Creek.

A daughter, Mrs. Miriam Weaver, died in 1924. Surviving are two grandchildren, Mrs. Evelyn Clark and Mrs. June McIntyre, both of Canyonville, and five great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held in the Methodist Church at Myrtle Creek, Sunday, Feb. 13, at 2 p.m., with Rev. Alexander Hawthorne officiating. Concluding services and interment will follow in Myrtle Creek I. O. O. F. cemetery. Funeral arrangements are in charge of the Long & Orr Mortuary.

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—(AP)—CARE, overseas relief distributing agency, has cut off shipment of food and clothing parcels to Hungary.

The agency said yesterday its agreement with the Hungarian communist government had expired, and that efforts to negotiate a new agreement had been unsuccessful.

CARE said "no political considerations" on its own part were involved.

At the same time the organization announced that because of an Economic Administration subsidy it had cut the cost of its parcels from the present \$10 to \$7.75.

HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 11.—(AP)—The trial of Cardinal Mindszenty, the Hungarian prelate, was held yesterday for the first time by Warner Bros.

Vice President Jack L. Warner said he has asked for a screen play based on the Hungarian prelate's trial and sentence by the communists.

VIENNA, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Robin Steussy, American vice consul in Budapest who left Hungary at the request of the Hungarian government, said today that charges he helped refugees flee Hungary were "fantastic and absurd."

Steussy, 27, of Madison, Wis., arrived here yesterday by automobile. He said Hungarian police watched every step he took during his last two days in Budapest.

He said he did not have time to pack all his personal belongings but was so happy to leave he "really did not mind."

Education Committee that, because of the big annual increases in school population, the state either must increase school support or reorganize the whole school system.

He said it's unfortunate that most of Oregon's new population is settling in counties which have high school taxes and low property valuations.

Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, said the bills needed because of the increased birth rate, high school costs, and the time lag between increased school district wealth and eventual taxable land value.

Bills to license and regulate ice cream manufacturers, eliminate the requirement that butter grades be printed on the package, and let the State Agriculture Department take over a city's milk inspection if city testing is below standard were introduced in the House today at the request of the dairy industry.

The Senate voted yesterday to make banks remain open on Columbus day.

Voting on strictly party lines, it defeated 20 to 10 a motion to close banks on Thomas Jefferson's birthday. It was sponsored by the Democrats.

A bill to make county offices outside of Multnomah County open at 8 a. m. daily was introduced by Rep. Lloyd R. Crosby, Milwaukie. The present opening time is 8:30 a. m.

A bill permitting the State Board of Higher Education to include five alumni of the five state-operated colleges and universities was introduced.

Personal Property Tax Warning

Personal property declaration forms were sent out Jan. 1, 1949 with a request for their return by Feb. 1st. To date a great number of these forms have not been returned.

Section 110-349, OCLA 1941 reads as follows . . .

"The assessor shall cause blank forms for such returns to be prepared and distributed, but failure to receive or secure the form shall not relieve any such person, managing agent or officer from the obligation of making any return herein required . . . All returns filled under the provisions of this section shall be confidential records of the Assessor's office."

Section 110-608, OCLA 1941 "Any such person, managing agent or officer who shall with intent to evade taxation, refuse or neglect to make any return herein required and to file it with the assessor with in the time specified or as extended shall be subject to a penalty of Ten Dollars \$10.00 per day of the continuance of such refusal or neglect . . ."

overcharges or rent act violations.

Reads Case Docketed

Thirty tenants, occupants of Reed's Cabins at Reedsport between May 1, 1945, and November 10, 1948, are involved in an action to recover \$2,687 in alleged rent overcharges from Robin Reed, their landlord, in a third suit in the federal court.

Return of the over-riding rent collections, and a permanent injunction against further overcharging and other rent act violations, is also asked by the federal rent agency in this case, which has not yet been set for trial.

"The rent laws give landlords 14 legal grounds for obtaining higher legal rents, by making application to the rent control office, when such increases can be justified," E. Daryl Mabee, Portland-Vancouver Defense Rental Area director, at Portland, said in discussing the Douglas County cases.

"However, we will not countenance illegal rent overcharging," Mabee said, "and if necessary, we are prepared to prefer court charges against violating landlords."

County Outlook Told

J. Roland Parker, county agricultural extension agent, addressed the gathering on the poultry outlook in Douglas County. In 1925, he said, five per cent of the agricultural income came from poultry. In 1945, 30 per cent of the agricultural income came from poultry.

Conditions here are "particularly favorable" to people living on small tracts who would be willing to give the necessary attention to raising chickens, he said.

Dr. Parker, who spoke on the statewide poultry outlook, said that the future of commercial egg producing is "very good" here and that the federal government had recommended a 15 per cent increase in production for Oregon. He also pointed out that the future is good for production of broiler hens.

Special meeting of the Roseburg City Council is scheduled at 5 o'clock this afternoon to discuss means of paying the cost of the Jackson Street Improvement and Kinney Addition sewers. Since the source of revenue on these projects is from assessments, the money is not available until such assessments are paid. To avoid holding up the contractor's money any longer, the city issued improvement fund warrants, but the banks would not honor them. Possibility of borrowing from the city sinking funds with the money to be replaced as soon as the assessments are paid will be discussed.
