

Number of Atomic Bombs Possessed by U. S. Should Be Secret, Truman Declares

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—(AP)—The number of atomic bombs the United States has should be kept secret, President Truman said yesterday.

A reporter told the President at his news conference that Chairman Lillenthal of the Atomic Energy Commission had suggested that this country should tell the world how many atomic bombs it has.

Mr. Truman denied that Lillenthal had made any such suggestion and said that he, personally, is emphatically not in favor of that.

And, he added significantly, he does not believe it is a matter for public discussion.

The President said he had talked with Lillenthal and Lillenthal had made no such suggestion.

Russia has demanded before the United Nations that the United States reveal the size of the A-bomb stockpile.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 11.—(AP)—An Air Force officer says the atomic bomb is the size of a golf ball and is equal to 5,000,000 pounds of TNT.

Mr. Col. William R. Stark, member of a five-man team from the Industrial College of the Armed Forces, puts it this way in a summary of a speech prepared for delivery at the Navy Armory here.

"The atomic bomb, the size of one golf ball, would be the equivalent of 200 ten-ton TNT bombs, the damage of such a bomb comes from three sources—blast, flash heat and radioactivity."

He said the atomic bomb's blast is no different from other bombs,

except in force but added: "The flash heat can inflict burns at the distance of three miles."

He said radioactivity was responsible for 10 percent of the deaths in Japan and "many deaths ascribed to shock and burns would have occurred from radioactivity anyhow."

The lieutenant-colonel speaks at a two-week course on economic mobilization.

Portland Group Backs Deschutes Dam Project

PORTLAND, Feb. 10.—(AP)—The Portland Labor-Management Committee wants the Legislature to take favorable action on proposals of private power companies to put a hydroelectric dam on the Deschutes River.

The committee said the dam would provide 18 months' work for 1200 to 1800 men and help ease the tight power supply situation.

In a resolution, the Committee asked the House Public Utilities Committee to submit an adverse report on H. B. 131. This bill would prohibit dams on the lower Deschutes.

Sports and commercial fishing interests oppose the Deschutes project planned for near Madras. They argue the lower Columbia tributaries should be preserved for fish spawning grounds.

Damages Sought In Traffic Blow

John E. Lamm has brought suit in Circuit Court for injuries allegedly sustained when he was struck by a car at Canyonville, Aug. 24, 1948. Named as defendants in the suit are W. G. Phillips, the alleged driver, and Jane Doe Phillips, his wife.

General damages of \$3000, special damages of \$1200 for alleged loss of wages and \$217.75 for doctor, hospital and medical expenses are asked.

According to the complaint, Lamm was run into while crossing Highway 99 at First Street in Canyonville, thrown to the ground "with great force and violence."

"...terribly bruising, wounding and contusing the plaintiff all over his body." He further alleges he sustained a severely wrenched neck and neck, that he suffered severe lacerations of the scalp, great physical pain and mental anguish and that his nervous system was permanently shocked. He claims he has been forced to earn a livelihood by doing only light work, resulting in a loss of \$1200 annually. Negligence on the part of the defendant is charged.

Fireman Spurns Pay Hike From Beer Tax Revenue

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Feb. 11.—(AP)—A Chattanooga fireman says he wants no part of a \$20 pay increase if the money comes from a proposed city beer tax.

A bill granting a \$20 per month increase for Chattanooga policemen and firemen has been approved by the State Senate and now goes to the House.

Senator Cain Will Oppose Appointment of Wallgren To Federal Resources Board

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Senator Cain (R-Wash.) served notice yesterday he will ask the Senate to disapprove President Truman's appointment of Mon C. Wallgren as chairman of the National Securities Resources Board.

Cain advised the Senate Armed Services Committee he wants to testify before the group acts on the nomination.

Wallgren, a Democrat, was defeated last November in his race for re-election as governor of Washington. He is a close friend of President Truman and often accompanies the President on fishing trips and other pleasure excursions. He and Mr. Truman became friends when both were serving in the Senate.

Cain told a reporter he will raise the point that Wallgren is "personally obnoxious" to him. Under Senate custom, when a member makes such a point, he usually is sustained in it by other members.

There is some doubt, however, that a single Republican senator's objection in such a case would be honored by Democrats who are in control of the Senate.

Cain said he plans to present evidence to the Armed Services Committee concerning Wallgren's activities as governor.

"The question that arises in my mind," Cain said, "is this: Is this nominee qualified to fill what is potentially one of the two or three most powerful jobs in the government?"

Cain noted that while Democrats swept other Washington State offices, Wallgren was defeated for re-election by about
