

Indians Wallop Red Devils 49 to 34

Roseburg Boys Score at Will In Local Tilt

Hubbard and Schindler Spark Locals; Chockran High Scorer with 16

The Roseburg Indians added another scalp to their belt, defeating the Coquille Red Devils 49-34 in a District 5 game at Roseburg High School Friday night.

Don Hubbard, high-scoring Indian forward, tallied the first two buckets, and that was a sign for the rest of the team to do likewise. The Red Devils could only muster three gift throws in the initial period, while the locals ran up the score to 21.

Coach Jack Newby sent in his reserves in the second period and they were an even-steven match for the visitors. The half saw the Indians up 25-12.

The starting five went back in the third and paced the Coquille club 35-20 at the end of the canto. After the first quarter lead, however, the so-so crowd caught the handwriting on the wall. The usual enthusiasm was lacking, with the exception of that of the rally squad which always appears in fine fettle, win-lose-or-draw.

Bob Sanders looked extremely good on a long dribble up the court, after which he plopped in a longie, good for the 37th Roseburg point. Don Hubbard followed up with another pusher for two and added a charity shot immediately thereafter.

Bob Schindler expiated a previous goose-egg game by racking up 12 counters in the Coquille tussle. He put in a beau from the side that hardly touched the rim, then followed with a lay in that looked extremely good from the stage.

Daryl Blanck sneaked in a gift shot, after which Schindler again came back with a long one from the key that popped the thongs without touching the rim. Doug Gandy put in the last Indian bucket, a long one that hit dead center.

The second Roseburg team returned to the game and succeeded in giving the Coquillers a very bad time. Neil Wising got his hands on the ball and prouetted in the general direction of the basket. He let loose with a very promising lay in, but the ball adloped around the rim and was headed west, when last seen.

Clint Agee looked good underneath the backboards, recovering the ball at will. He and the larger Blanck each scored six points.

Hubbard and Schindler, with 12 points each, were the big scoring sticks on the local casaba crew, while Garey came through with seven. For Coquille, Don Chockran made almost half his team's points, with 16. Bob Geaney was second best with six. Both Chockran and Geaney did yeoman service for the invaders, but couldn't hack it alone.

Roseburg made 10 out of 17 shots good on the free throw line, and Coquille hit 11 out of 19.

Roseburg lays over until Tuesday, Feb. 15, when the boys will engage Myrtle Creek in a game here. This should be a torrid tussle, as both the Vikings

Oregon Humbles Train Weary Cougars 49 to 38

(By The Associated Press) Slow and arduous travel sharpened the Idaho Vandals and dulled the Washington State Cougars last night at the two Palouse country basketball teams split in western invasions.

The Cougars, 26 hours in getting to Eugene, fell easy prey to the Oregon Ducks, 49-38, and tumbled a half-game down into second place behind the idle Ore-State Beavers.

The Vandals, bagging half their 44 shots from the field, ran away from the University of Washington Huskies at Seattle, 64-47, to shunt the erstwhile Coast Conference Champions into the Northern Division cellar, and to convert the Idaho claim to fourth place.

Both Idaho and W. S. C., were delayed by mountain slides.

Oregon hopped into an early six-point lead and the Cougars never could come closer than five points thereafter.

The winners held a 30-19 halftime advantage. Roger Wiley's 19 points boosted his 11-game conference total for the Ducks to 163 points, an average of 14.8 per game. Meanwhile Oregon bottled up the Cougar sparkplug, Ed Gayda, who missed four field shots and bagged four free throws.

Third place Oregon, only one game behind the Cougars, will try to close the gap at Eugene tonight in a return fray.

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Three of the country's top ten ranking college basketball teams took it on the chin last night. The Oklahoma Aggies, No. 3 in the latest Associated Press poll, went down before Oklahoma, 54-41.

San Francisco, No. 9, fell before Bradley, 54-52, and Stanford, No. 10, absorbed a 54-44 licking from Southern California.

Western Kentucky, No. 6, chalked up a 67-58 victory over Baldwin-Wallace and Tulane, No. 8, walloped Mississippi, 74-34.

The remainder of the top ten: Kentucky, No. 1; St. Louis, No. 2; Illinois, No. 4; Hamline, No. 5; and Minnesota, No. 7, were idle.

Southern California's victory over Stanford gave the Trojans the lead in the hot Southern Division race of the Pacific Coast Conference.

Wyoming kept its lead in the Big Six, beating Colorado Aggies, 56-39.

In the east Holy Cross trimmed Rhode Island State, 52-42. In the southern conference Duke's chances of getting into the championship tournament were dimmed by a 47-44 loss to North Carolina State.

2 Basketball Players Die in Train-Auto Crash

EAGLE LAKE, Tex., Feb. 12.—(AP)—Two members of a La Grange amateur basketball team were killed Thursday night and two others injured when their automobile and a Southern Pacific passenger train collided seven miles west of here.

Dead were Earl Edwin Lowery, 29, of Campbell, La Grange High School basketball coach and a player on the team, and Kermit Albert Brendle, 27, an instructor in the Texas veterans training program at La Grange.

The crash of the car and locomotive punctured a fuel tank and resulted in a fire which destroyed mail and express carried in the baggage compartment of the train. No passengers or train crew members were injured.

Willie Pep Regains Lost Featherweight Title

Battle worn and weary with 11 stitches in cuts around both eyes, Willie again holds the featherweight championship of the world after a four-month lapse.

Sandy Saddler, the spindly-legged Harlem slasher who de-throned Willie the Pep on a fourth round knockout Oct. 29, yielded to the ex-champ in a savage 15-round brawl last night at Madison Square Garden.

Before Pep did the trick, no man in modern day fight history ever recaptured the undisputed 126-pound crown after he lost it.
