Roach, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, performed the impressive double ring ceremony at eight o'clock in the presence of one-hundred relatives and close friends of the couple.

The improvised altar, in front of the large picture window in the living room, overlooking the lighted garden and terrace, was arranged with two huge white floor baskets holding stock, tulips, carnations and freesia all in white and flanked by candelabra holding tall white tapers.
