Arthur Eugene Gardiner, 75, retired postal employee, died at his home in Drain Saturday evening after a short illness. He was born at Drain Dec. 21, 1873, and had been a resident of Douglas County 41 years. He had lived 34 years at Portland, where he was employed in the postal service.

He was the son of pioneer residents at Drain, the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas K. Gardner.

He was active in community affairs and was a member of the Christian Church at Drain. He was married twice, being survived by his widow, Mrs. Lena Gardner, Drain, and a son and two daughters, Elbert Gardner, Portland; Mrs. Esther Cottingham, San Francisco, and Mrs. Doris Corry, Ashland. A sister and brother, Mrs. Laura Cooper and Karl Gardner, also survive.

Funeral services will be held at the Christian Church at Drain at 10 a. m. Tuesday, with the Rev. I. M. Nelson officiating. Interment will take place in Yoncalla cemetery. Arrangements are in care of the Stearns Mortuary, Oakland.

School Bus Drivers Take First Aid Course

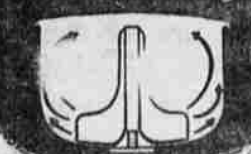

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Pope Pius Denounces Mindszenty's Persecution

of the Hungarian prime.

The Pope told 16 Cardinals of the Vatican and Italian Sees that fullest publicity had been given to protests throughout the non-communist world against the treatment of the cardinal. Then he added:

"But, as you are aware, the full light of publicity did not shine over the trial of this prelate, who deserved so well of all, in defending the religion of his ancestors and in the restoration of Christian morals. In fact, from the beginning, the news that arrived caused alarm. People outside Hungary who asked permission to be present at the trial were refused permission if they seemed likely to judge impartially or to give a sincere report; this led them to believe, and all upright and honest men as well, that those who were conducting the trial in Budapest seemed to be afraid to allow all to see what was taking place."

"But although the facts have not been reliably made known or reported clearly and completely, we cannot omit mentioning the judgment which all civilized people have passed on this trial."

Church Main Target

"The principle object of the trial," the pope said, "was to disrupt the Catholic Church in Hungary and precisely for the purpose set forth in the sacred scriptures."

"I shall strike the shepherd and the sheep of the flock shall be dispersed." (Mat. XXVI, 31). The pope declared Cardinal Mindszenty's physical condition during the trial was "inexplicable except as the result of secret influences which may not be publicly revealed; to prove this there is the fact that a man endowed with the full vigor of a forceful nature suddenly appears weak and mentally unbalanced."

The pontiff branded "completely false" the Hungarian government's assertions that "the whole question at issue was that this apostolic see, in furtherance of plans for political domination of nations, gave instructions to oppose the republic of Hungary and its rulers."

The unprecedented assembly convened six days after Cardinal Mindszenty, primate of Hungary, was sentenced to life imprisonment by a Hungarian people's court.

The leader of the Church in Hungary was the first cardinal in modern times arrested while actually wearing the purple of a prince of the Church.

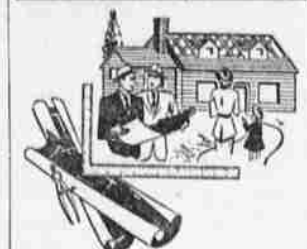
BEACH HOME BURNS

garia, and the current purges in Poland and Czechoslovakia.

A by-product of the Mindszenty trial was the case of Selden Chapin, U. S. minister to Hungary, charged with espionage. The cardinal was involved with the cardinal in his alleged offenses, and asked the diplomat's removal. The U. S., disputing this, called Chapin home "for consultation." The U. S. State Department is now in a Hungarian legation aide in retaliation for the forcing out of two U. S. representatives from Budapest.

The satellite "Peoples Democracies" permit a continued existence of some organized political parties, while the Communists have a free rein in putting their totalitarian system into effect.

Legation Under Guard

A 24-hour police guard has been established outside the Hungarian legation as the result of a reported telephone threat against Hungarian Minister Andrew Sik. Police officials, disclosing this today, said the request for the guard came from the State Department. They did not reveal any details of the reported threat.

Hungary-Ousted Minister Prepares to Leave for U. S.

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Diplomatic circles said today that U. S. Minister Selden Chapin, whose ouster has been demanded by Hungary, will leave here Wednesday or Thursday on an American plane.

The Communist-dominated Hungarian government demanded Chapin's recall in an aftermath to the treason case of Josef Cardinal Mindszenty. Chapin was accused during the trial of encouraging the cardinal to support a monarchy.

In Washington it was announced Chapin had been recalled "for consultations."

A brief government statement today said Chapin was considered "persona non grata" and added that Dr. Andrew Sik, Hungary's minister to Washington, had transmitted the demand for Chapin's recall to the U. S. State Department.

Informants said Mrs. Chapin will accompany her husband on the plane which will come here from Vienna. Clearance from local authorities will be required for the plane to leave here.

It is understood William B. Cochran, legation counselor, will serve as charge d'affaires in Chapin's absence.

they lacked engineering experience.

The bill's \$466,882,177 total is \$14,002,400 below a aggregate budget requests and all the money is for use during the fiscal year ending next June 30.

Included is \$33,437 increased compensation for the President, voted just before the inauguration.

Other Items Allowed

Other allotments include: Interior Department: \$24,659,300, a cut of \$2,961,200; Items approved include \$4,500,000 for the Columbia Basin project in Washington, \$4,500,000 for the Missouri Basin reclamation project and \$300,000 for the Lewiston Orchards project in Idaho.

Army engineers: \$10,500,000 for river and harbor maintenance and improvement, \$14,000,000 for general flood control work and \$2,500,000 for emergency flood control work in the Columbia Basin. The \$27,000,000 total is \$3,000,000 short of budget requests.

Displaced persons commission: \$1,200,000, a cut of \$300,000 under requests.

Grants to states for public assistance: \$151,000,000, the amount requested; and for unemployment compensation and employment service, the full request of \$4,987,000.

Housing and home finance agency: \$4,000,000, a cut of \$800,000.

Veterans Administration: \$99,379,000, including \$55,000,000 for veterans life insurance, and \$44,189,000 for miscellaneous veterans' benefits.

Snow was two to three feet deep in places on the hills surrounding Rice Valley. Wednesday there was a break in the weather when it started to rain. Friday morning there was a fresh fall of snow. It was also snowing Saturday.

Snow also collapsed the roofs of the Shepherd and Lowman sawmills in the Rice Valley community.
