Special Dishes For Birthday Of Geo. Washington

For the Washington's Birthday dinner, set your table with the 18th century beauty of Mt. Vernon. If you have a white Irish linen damask cloth in an Adam pattern, use it. Washington used Chinese export porcelain which is now being reproduced and you may have some. Reproductions of 18th century crystal goblets and silver pieces would complete this Mt. Vernon table of yours.

Tradition calls for cherries on Washington's birthday. Here's a cherry roll for that purpose:

Cherry Roll (Serves 6-8)

Two cups baking powder, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 6 tablespoons shortening, 2/3 cup milk, 1 can red cherries, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 teaspoon mace.

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in shortening with pastry blender or fingers. Add milk gradually to form a soft dough. Knead lightly. Roll out to 1/4-inch thickness. Drain juice from cherries. Add sugar, mace and vanilla. Spread over dough. Roll like a jelly roll. Dot with butter. Pour 2 cups of water over roll which will produce its own sauce. Bake 35 to 40 minutes in moderate oven (350 degrees F.).

That delicious recipe comes from Freda DeKnight's "Date With a Dish." So does the Virginia peanut pie, also appropriate for the Washington party.

Virginia Peanut Pie (Serves 6-8)

Two-thirds cup sugar, 1/4 tea-

spoon salt, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/2 cup ground peanuts, 1-table spoon vanilla, 1 baked pie shell, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, 1 1/2 cups milk, 2 eggs, 4 tablespoons sugar, dash mace.

Combine 2/3 cup sugar, salt, cornstarch in double boiler. Add butter and stir in egg yolks. Cook until thick. Add ground peanuts. Pour into pie shell. Beat egg whites stiff. Add mace, vanilla and 4 tablespoonsful sugar. Beat until stiff but not dry. Cover with meringue and bake 15 to 20 minutes in a slow oven (300 degrees F.).

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Medical Assn. Substitute For Truman's Health Insurance Plan Draws Rap in Congress

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The American Medical Association's substitute for President Truman's health insurance program was assailed by Rep. Dingell (D-Mich.) today as "a plan to perpetuate pauperism of the sick and helpless."

"I consider the AMA proposal a cheap imitation of the real thing," he told reporters. Dingell is one of the authors of the administration health legislation.

The AMA announced organized medicine's alternative plan in Chicago last night, proposing expansion of voluntary hospital and medical care plans instead of federal health insurance. Some leaders in the medical profession have attacked the Truman administration plan as "socialized medicine."

Dingell said he thinks Mr. Truman's program has an "excellent chance" of passage in Congress. Some others were not so sure.

Republicans charted an all-out fight on the proposal for universal medical care insurance. Senator Taft (R-Ohio) proposed instead that the federal government help states finance voluntary health insurance programs.

More trouble ahead was also indicated as Senator Hill (D-Ala.) said the administration program "goes too far in the matter of compulsion."

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Cheese Factory At Reedsport To Have New Location

The Reedsport Creamery cheese factory will be moved next week-end from its present location in the Umpqua River Navigation Co. warehouse building on the waterfront, to its new building erected on Fir Avenue during the winter.

The new building was designed for the creamery, and is constructed of a special type of block that is said to be almost moisture proof. The new building is not quite completed, according to Andy Anderson, who has had charge of construction, but is far enough along so that machinery and equipment can be moved and installed this week.

It is necessary that the move be made immediately, before milk shipments to the cheese factory start increasing after the slack season.

The Cream Crest Dairy of Reedsport will also move into the new building. It is now located on the lower floor of the Eagles Hall building. Svend Knutson is the owner of the creamery and cheese factory, and Harry Maxwell owns the Cream Crest Dairy.

The old wooden building now housing the cheese factory was condemned for that purpose, with time allowed to move into a new building.
