

Indians Trim Vikings, 43-34

Victory Boosts RHS Chance Of Tourney Entry

Roseburg's determined Indians, led by high-scoring Clint Agee, with 16 counters, and Bob Schindler with 13, pulled ahead of a hard-hitting Myrtle Creek Viking club near the end of the basketball game and went on to win 43-34 at Senior High Tuesday night. The win gives Roseburg a better than even chance of going to the North Bend tourney early next month.

The visitors got off the first tally and it was a mad scramble after that to maintain any semblance of a lead, which changed so often it was never for certain which team would come out on top.

The Indian starters never left the floor until the final minute of action, with the exception of Bob Rogers, who helped out on the forward wall.

Both Agee and Schindler were hot with the ball, with the six-foot-five Agee connecting on the lay-ins, while the diminutive Schindler dropped them in from way out.

With five minutes to go in the third quarter, it was a battle between Schindler and Arlen Weaver, high scoring Viking guard, to see which club would hold the lead. Schindler broke

Mathews poured nine points through the hoop to lead the Warriors to a 33-9 count at the end of the third period.

Coach Norm West sent in his reserves in the final period and they held the Myrtle Creek cage crew to only five counters, while caging 10 themselves.

Robinson, Brimm Draw In Torrid 10-Round Battle

BUFFALO, N. Y., Feb. 16.—(AP) The third man welterweight champion Ray Robinson has failed to lick in 91 pro bouts is Henry Brimm, a local scrapper.

Brimm battled the heavily favored champion to a 10-round draw in a non-title headliner here last night.

Robinson lost once to Jake La Motta in Detroit in 1943 and was held to a draw by Jose Basora in Philadelphia in 1945.

Brimm used tight crosses and sharp jabs to advantage throughout the fight. He inflicted a small cut over Robinson's left eye in the fourth round and made the eye a target the rest of the way.

Robinson cut loose with both barrels in the later round, but Brimm came back with a terrific finish. Twice they failed to hear the bell.

Both fighters got an ovation from the crowd at the finish.
