Communist, Socialist Heads Differ In Views On Proposed Atlantic Security Treaty

WASHINGTON, May 12 — (AP) — Spokesmen for the Communist and Socialist parties took opposite sides Wednesday on the North Atlantic Security Alliance.

Eugene Dennis, general secretary of the Communist party, called the pact "aggressive" and told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that this country "cannot even pretend to good faith" in negotiations with Russia if it is ratified.

He argued also that it "commits the United States to forcible suppression of all popular movements" in signatory nations.

Norman Thomas, veteran leader of American Socialists, argued before the same Senate group that failure to ratify the pact "might be a tremendous jolt to governments and parties in Europe on which the hope of democracy depends."

Though he approved the pact, Thomas cautioned that grave dangers are inherent in it.

Thomas said he has received no answer to his question whether military men believe "we can make Western Europe invulnerable if the Russian high command should decide that the hour had come to attack."

He said American actions may convince the world of our sincere intent to act against aggressors and "thus strengthen the morale of our friends and weaken our potential enemies."

Then he added: "Along that line of argument lie dangers; the danger of raising false hopes; the danger of building up a whole network of national military machines insatiably crying for more; the danger of aggravating rather than minimizing the armament race without compensating guarantee of that precarious thing—military security."

Reading of the Dennis statement was delegated to Howard Johnson, New York State educa-

tional director of the Party. Dennis himself is on trial in New York City with ten other top Communists on charges of conspiracy to advocate forcible overthrow of the government.

Fred Boysen Freed Of Charge Of Robbery

NEW YORK, May 12 — (AP) — Fred Boysen was freed Tuesday of a robbery charge filed against him after he withdrew an assault complaint he had made against Leo Durocher, manager of the Giants baseball team.

Magistrate Samuel Orr in felony court dismissed the complaint filed by Mrs. Mary Ryan, 49, Negro nurse, on the ground that her story was "a figment of her imagination induced by newspaper publicity."

Mrs. Ryan said she identified Boysen, 24, a Puerto Rican, from his pictures published after he charged that Durocher attacked him at the Polo Grounds April 28.
